The North Carolina Arboretum, Milepost 393, Blue Ridge Parkway, 100 Frederick Law Olmsted Way, Asheville. **Baker Exhibit Center Gallery, Through May 14** - "An Abundance of Riches: Woodcuts of Andrea Rich". Rich's intricately designed, carved, and printed woodcuts draw viewers in for an up-close look. Some of the artist's earliest memories are of drawing animals. Childhood encounters with pets, livestock, and wildlife, including birds, deer, and toads, created a lasting connection to the natural world. Through encounters with creatures both tame and wild, Rich developed a fascination and a compassion for animals integral to her art. **Ongoing** - The Asheville Quilt Guild features a permanent, rotating quilt exhibit at Arboretum's Education Center. Rock. Through May 14 - "Recent Acquisitions to BRAHM's Permanent Collection." The exhibition highlights 16 artworks including gifts and promised gifts to the Permanent Collection. "Recent Acquisitions" presents new additions to BRAHM's vault in light of some of the different ways objects might come into a museum's collection as well as the responsibility of care that an institution undertakes when accepting such objects. BRAHM's expansion of the Permanent Collection has largely been accomplished through the generosity of art collectors who have donated or promised artworks that align with the scope of the Museum's mission. **Rankin West Gallery, Through Mar. 18** - "Coast to Coast: Contrasts & Shared Values Across American Impressionism." "Coast to Coast" draws connections across impressionist painting as it was practiced across opposite sides of America in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, focussing on the artists who made the journey—some permanently and some temporarily—and how the relationships that emerged between them led to a dynamic and often divergent approach to plein-air painting. Questions of style, training, the commercial market, and even the physical landscape itself emerge as a network of conditions that encouraged a vibrant departure from East Coast impressionism. This exhibition will include works by Maurice Braun, Alson S. Clark, Elliott Daingerfield, Childe Hassam, Jane Peterson, William Merritt Post, Hanson Putthuf, Jack Wilkinson Smith, and many others. **Cannon Gallery, Through May 7** - "Geometry with Feeling: Ida Kohlmeyer in Two & Three Dimensions". The exhibit features the work of Ida Kohlmeyer (1912–1997), most recognized for her role in the vanguard of abstract painting in the American South. BRAHM is pleased to be exhibiting examples of her two and three-dimensional work in our Atwell Gallery in the Fall of 2022. Taking up the brush during middle age, Kohlmeyer quickly developed a distinctive vocabulary of organic and geometric forms that she deployed with irrepressibly bright colors. While abstract expressionist painting is now fully integrated into the canon of American art, it was a controversial turn for an emerging New Orleans artist in the 1950s and 1960s. **Caine Gallery, Bales/Garrison Gallery, & Mezzanine, Through Mar. 4** - "The WFDD 2022 Photo of the Year," exhibition showcases all 52 submissions that were chosen as Photo of the Week last year and gives visitors the opportunity to vote for their favorites. As a public radio station based in the Piedmont Triad area, WFDD connects their audience through these featured snapshots from around the region, including some captured here in the High Country. These images illustrate the breadth of North Carolina's culture and natural beauty, from a sunrise in Linville Gorge to an evening at the Carolina Classic Fair. **Ongoing** - the BRAHM will host exhibits, educational programs and classes that promote the visual arts, history and heritage of the mountains of western North Carolina. Turchin Center for the Visual Arts, Appalachian State University, 423 West King Street, Boone. **Mezzanine Gallery, Through Feb. 4** - "Folded and Gathered: Nicole Pietrantonio". Pietrantonio's exhibition, "Folded and Gathered", consists of vibrant printed accordion books on Japanese papers that expand to create large scale installations. Much of her work is informed by her time in beautiful but ecologically fragile landscapes. According to Pietrantonio, "My artists' books and installations explore the representation of beauty in times of loss, photography's role in producing memory and humans' relationship to the environment. Taking an experimental approach to the book form, my art asks how the book and printed matter can both enable and undercut humans' active role in constructing and idealizing images. Rather than a fixed site or single image, the fragmented paper columns, text, and book forms engage the world as an unstable accumulation of processes, perceptions and narratives." **Gallery B, Through May 6** - "Altered Environments / Tidalectics: April Flanders, Guest Curator". "Altered Environments", curated by April Flanders, is a printmaking portfolio responding to the issue of marine bio invasions. The portfolio includes 23 national and international artists from diverse backgrounds, utilizing a wide range of styles and print techniques. Marine bio invasions are the conceptual starting place for these prints, which will be prominently exhibited at the 11th International Marine Bioinvasions Conference in Annapolis, MD in 2023. Aquatic invasive species are a true threat to biodiversity around the world. Artists were encouraged to consider the many ecosystems that are currently under threat from marine bioinvaders. In conjunction with "Altered Environments", printmaker and installation artist, Marilee Salvator will create a site-specific installation. "Tidalectics", organized by Dutch-Canadian artist Eveline Koliijn, is an art-science portfolio based around an experiment to create an oceanic worldview. Ten international printmakers collaborated with marine biology researchers to create a print based on the research from the scientist for the portfolio. **Gallery A, Through May 6** - "Thin Places: Kiliij Yuyan". Yuyan says, "I will always remember those nights with the burning, glowing embrace of the fireflies. In the space around my body, they floated like a thousand miniature green-yellow lanterns, blazing long enough to be seen, but gone quickly enough to escape my cupped hands. It's embedded in me to see the fireflies as spirit beings here. I've never met a person who hasn't felt their otherworldly nature. Indeed, my Indigenous ancestors referred to wild creatures as 'men in other shirts'. For animistic peoples, our world is inhabited by spirits, which only reveal themselves in particular circumstances or places. But somehow, I think, we all feel this regardless of where we come from." **Mayer Gallery, Through May 6** - "Transformations: App DigiFab," featuring works by Adam Adcock, Andrew Bailey Arend,

Travis Donovan, Derek Eggers, Richard Elaver, Frankie Flood, Chelsea Helms, Mark Nystrom, Andres Tellez, and Nicole Villarreal. An exhibition of new design and art works showcasing experimental applications of computer-aided design and fabrication technologies. Digital design and fabrication technologies have radically transformed the way artists and designers conceive and produce work. This exhibition explores how digital tools for design and fabrication are being utilized and taught by contemporary artists, designers, and architects, and how those tools influence the work being produced in various fields. A group of faculty and staff from Appalachian State University have come together to exhibit their new work using these digital tools in unique ways.
