Featuring traditional and contemporary African masks, figurative woodcarvings, beadwork, jewelry, and textiles. ## Blowing Rock

**Blowing Rock Art and History Museum**, corner of Chestnut and Main streets, downtown Blowing Rock. **Fort Gallery, Through June 2** - "Pulp & Bind: Paper & Book in Southern Appalachia". The exhibition brings together 18 artists working across Southern Appalachia who are deeply engaged with the mediums of paper and book as forms and concepts. The exhibition is the culmination of a series of survey-oriented group exhibitions undertaken by BRAHM to map the state of Craft across the region through a lens of artists working with an acute focus on craft-associated mediums. **Rankin East and West galleries, Through May 5** - "Lee Hall: Immediate Landscapes. Lee Hall (1934 - 2017) had a long and varied career in the arts but her deep North Carolina roots always seemed to bring her and her work back to the Tarheel State. Born in Lexington, NC, her abstract expressionist paintings are vivid examples of those traditions while retaining the kind of detail that truly brings a viewer into a specific place and time. A graduate of the Women's College of the University of North Carolina (now the University of North Carolina-Greensboro), Hall was one of the first women to make headway in the post-WWII New York art scene. **Cannon Gallery, Through June 30** - "Highlights: Selections from BRAHM's Permanent Collection". BRAHM stewards a growing Permanent Collection of over 800 objects. Museums build collections for a variety of reasons preserving artworks and other objects of historical importance for future generations; cataloging, documenting, and researching said objects; and displaying and interpreting the collection for the public through exhibitions, publications, and other educational programs. Schaefer Gallery, Through Apr. 20, 2024 - "Crafted Modern: The Collection of Rob Williams. **Schaefer Gallery, Through Apr. 20** - "Crafted Modern: The Collection of Rob Williams". The Studio Craft movement of the 20th Century witnessed a broad resurgence of artists working in mediums historically understood to be less precious than their fine art counterparts. "Revelation" supports the mission of the Turchin Center to showcase creative responses to local, regional, and global climate change. All of O'Neill's ethereal landscapes were made in the South. The land bears the ongoing scarification of a deeply troubled history at the same time the photographs reveal the beauty of what yet may be lost if we do not find a more equitable way to care for the lands of which we are the current stewards. **Hodges Gallery, Through June 1** - "Trophic Cascade: April Flanders". The web of life under the surface of aquatic ecosystems is exceedingly complex and devastatingly beautiful. In a place where species interactions begin at a microscopic level, small changes have huge impacts and huge changes wreak havoc. Remove a key predator, and prey takes over; add another predator, and the first one declines. With the rise of globalization, human mediated transfer mechanisms give rise to invasive species, overwhelming the delicate balance of aquatic ecosystems. These unintended ecological interventions cause Trophic Cascades, revealing nature's fragility. Invasion biology in marine environments is especially fraught. The eradication or management of invasive species on land, while economically and environmentally challenging, is possible. The successful management of these species underwater is nearly impossible. This exhibition addresses the causes and impacts of marine bio-invasaders on a global scale, conferring visibility to species normally unseen. **Gallery A and Petti/Peiser Galleries, Through May 4** - "Considering Carbon: Kathleen Thum". "The exhibition, Considering Carbon, consists of a series of drawings and cut-paper wall installations which explore the theme of fossil fuels, specifically oil and coal. In the exhibition, I use different visual and conceptual approaches to examine the physical, material qualities of coal and oil, as I aim to heighten an awareness of our disconnection and dependence on fossil fuels. Oil and coal are an integral part of our contemporary existence, yet remain mysterious, unknown substances, contained and controlled by the industry," says Thum. "Large-scale wall installation artworks in the exhibition consider the infrastructure of the pipeline system through a visual language of abstraction to communicate the vastness of the petroleum infrastructure. In these large cut-paper pieces, I evoke the visceral, sensory quality of the petroleum landscape by using scale, texture, surface, color and the non-traditional presentation of drawings to engage the body of the viewer," adds Thum. **Ackland Art Museum**, UNC - Chapel Hill, Columbia & Franklin Streets, Chapel Hill. **Through Feb. 18** - "Focus on the Peck Collection: Jo-Hannes Stradanus and The Hunt". Though Netherlandish artist Jan van der Straet, better known as Johannes Stradanus, spent the majority of his career in Italy, a high percentage of his artistic output was made for print publishers in the northern European city of Antwerp. In addition to making designs for religious, historical, and allegorical scenes, Stradanus also made images of the hunt. With his long-time collaborator, the prolific print publisher Philips Galle (Dutch, 1537-1612), Stradanus created a series of 104 compositions illustrating the various hunting methods of specific animals, which were then published as engravings. This "Focus on the Peck Collection" installation presents one drawing of a fox hunt from the Peck Collection and two engravings of boar hunts after Stradanus's designs. The drawing, though not preparatory for the accompanying engravings, demonstrates how the artist's distinctive and highly descriptive compositions were translated by northern European engravers into extremely successful prints for the market. **Through July 21** - "Pantheress," by Georgie Nakima. "Pantheress" is a site-specific installation by Charlotte, NC-based artist Georgie Nakima. Her vibrant and multi-layered painting highlights the complexities of the Black American experience and the indomitable resilience of the Diaspora. Featuring spray paint on cut wood with custom-printed wallpaper, the central focus of this work challenges the conventions of classical portraiture by leaning into the world of the abstract motifs and visual aphorisms that surround her subject. The title of the piece, Pantheress, is a tribute to the instrumental work of the women of the Black Panther movement. The work, featuring timeless geometric and natural forms, can be seen as both a product of this past and a harbinger for a hopeful future. **Permanent Collection Galleries, Through Dec. 31, 2025** - At any one time, there are about 250 works of art from the Ackland's distinguished permanent collection on view. The displays cover many eras and cultures, including most of the Museum's collection areas: the Ancient Mediterranean, Africa, Asia, the Americas, and Europe.
