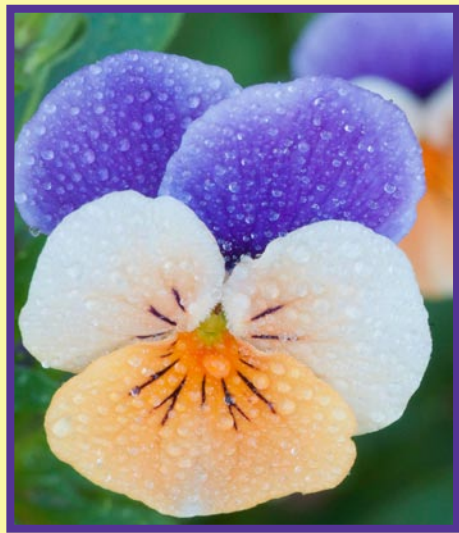

Wofford College in Spartanburg, SC, Offers Several New Exhibits

Wofford College in Spartanburg, SC, will offer several new exhibits including: *Julia Elizabeth Tolbert, Paintings and Drawings*, on view in the Sandor Teszler Library Gallery, from Apr. 13 through June 1, 2012, with a reception on Apr. 13, from 4-6pm; *Roxi Tolbert, Paintings*, on view in the Martha Cloud Chapman Gallery, from Apr. 13 through June 1, 2012; and *Second Annual Juried Student Art Exhibition*, on view in the Great Oaks Hall in Roger Milliken Science Center, from Apr. 24 through May 11, 2012, with a reception on Apr. 24, from 4-6pm.

Julia Elizabeth Tolbert was a native of Ninety Six, SC. She earned a MA from the University of Georgia where she studied under Lamar Dodd. Throughout her life she worked variously in Athens, GA; several South Carolina locations; Cashiers, NC; and Syracuse, NY. Her active period was through the 1940s into the mid-1950s. Because she was not interested in selling her work or even showing it very much, except for a few museums, such as the Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, and Atlanta, GA's High Museum, she is now unknown. In 2011, the Tolbert family donated

nearly the entire life-work corpus of her art to Wofford College, including paintings in oil and watercolor, drawing, prints, and ceramics. This exhibition of a very small portion of the collection is the first of several intended to bring a worthy artist back to the public eye.

Roxi Tolbert is a native of Fort Mill, SC, and holds a BFA from Winthrop University. She is now a doctoral student at Kent State University. This exhibition of her recent paintings will run concurrently with the showing of works by her great-aunt, Julia Elizabeth Tolbert, continuing the legacy of Tolbert family artists.

The exhibit, *Second Annual Juried Student Art Exhibition*, features works by current Wofford students which have been produced in fulfillment of a class assignment or independently, outside of class, or any time since Sept. 2010. No work in the exhibition was made prior to a student's enrollment at Wofford.

Skyuka Fine Art in Tryon, NC, Offers Look Back at Works from Tryon's Early Art Community

Skyuka Fine Art in Tryon, NC, is presenting the exhibit, *Historic Tryon Artists*, featuring works by noted collectors and art historians Nowell Guffey and Michael McCue, as well as numerous other private collectors, on view through Apr. 27, 2012.

This show focuses on the rich artistic history of Tryon and the Tryon Colony Artist's work produced in the first half of the 20th Century. During that time this area was a magnet for artists and intellectuals. In the 1920's Homer Ellertson and Lawrence Mazzanovich discovered Tryon and moved down from New York and Connecticut respectively. Many artists were seeking to simplify their lives. They appreciated the rustic beauty of the Foothills, and the temperate climate of the "Thermal Belt".

One example of an artist who successfully did this was Augustus Vincent Tack who moved here after living in New York and Paris. He and his wife sought out an equestrian friendly area and found it in Tryon. The area quickly became quite

fashionable as more and more creative types heard of their peer's discovery of the area and soon followed.

This exhibit honors approximately 20 of these artists, all outstanding representatives of this prestigious group. They include Elizabeth Paxton Oliver, Will Henry Stevens, Robert P. Lawrence, Amelia Watson, Homer Ellertson, John
