who have shown exceptional development in their careers as artists and whose artworks have directly influenced or had a significant impact on other artists within the field of woodturning as a whole.

Foster adds, "Mystery is essential to art. Rather than explain what each element means, I prefer to let the viewer find their own meaning. The Baule people of Africa believe too much clarity can hinder some kinds of enlightened understanding. I'll just say that my art combines elements and sources to capture the essence of things that endure, things that last, ancient voices that speak to our hearts in modern times. I'm inspired by temples and towers that point to

a higher plane; religious objects that have an aura of sacredness; household items that glow with a patina of lifelong loving use. The distinction blurs, and their story becomes our story."

Asheville Gallery of Art in Asheville, NC, Offers Works by Pat Perkerson

Asheville Gallery of Art in Asheville, NC, will present *Collage*, featuring works by Pat Perkerson, on view from May 2 - 31, 2014. A reception will be held on May 2, from 5-8pm.

Using figurative drawings, digital photography, decorative papers, paint, and pastel, Perkerson has created a series of vibrant mixed-media artworks.



Bold, vibrant colors and recurring designs are the foundations of his paintings, which are often created on found objects and architectural salvage. Vintage glass windows are principally used as canvas, which illuminate the richness of chosen hues, the depth of textures, and the motion of passing brush strokes.

The breadth of O'Sheeran's subject matter extends from the abstract and imaginary to landscapes and even the simplicity of everyday objects. He loves to find inspiration from the ocean, and a life spent by the water has infused his art with scenes from the sea. O'Sheeran takes pleasure in experimenting with pattern and his paintings exhibit movement from abstract forms to fish scales and feathers.

O'Sheeran's upbeat paintings and "tongue-in-cheek" touch of humor invite the discerning viewer to enjoy favorite *continued on Page 22*
