Burke Arts Council in Morganton, NC, Offers 3rd Studio Glass Exhibit

The mountains of North Carolina are home to some of the world's most talented studio glass artists. To recognize the exceptional work of these distinguished artists, and others, an exhibition of work is scheduled in a collaborative effort taking place in four downtown Morganton, NC, venues: The Burke Arts Council, Kalā Gallery, John S. Payne Photography, and Hamilton Williams Gallery. The *Third Annual Western North Carolina Studio Glass Exhibition* is scheduled to start June 2 and run through July 11, 2014. An opening reception for the artists is scheduled for June 14, from 5-8pm.

The exhibition includes glass that is functional and sculptural in design. This includes many unique vessels in varied shapes and hues, as well as sculptural forms in blown or cast glass. The four galleries will serve as singular venues for the exhibition and each will offer participants a distinct experience in viewing the entire exhibition of work.

Penland School of Crafts in Penland, NC, Features Works by Joseph Pintz

The Penland School of Crafts in Penland, NC, is presenting *Joseph Pintz: Ceramics*, an exhibition of functional ceramics by Joseph Pintz, on view in the Focus Gallery through June 22, 2014.

Pintz works with earthenware clay, hand-building understated utilitarian pots along with sculpture that echoes the forms of utensils and tools. This exhibition features simple bowls, cups, and serving pieces in a color palette of turquoise, white, amber, yellow, avocado, and pale pink. In contrast to the delicate colors, the pots are rugged and reminiscent of carved and painted wooden bowls from the turn of the century. The glazes and slips covering the clay are layered so that textures and the colors from the red earthenware clay are subtly revealed.

Talking about his tableware, Pintz says, "Sharing food with others and making the time to eat well are ideals I try to live up to in my daily life. The stubborn physicality of my pots forces one to slow down and pay close attention to the moment. In an age of ever-increasing speed, the dinner table is the perfect place to savor, to spend time, to share food and vessels made with integrity and purpose. I sincerely hope that such sustenance allows us to develop a deeper relationship to making and to each other."

Pintz is an assistant professor at the University of Missouri, Columbia, MO, and recently participated in the Roswell Artist-in-Residence Program in Roswell, NM. He will be teaching ceramics at Penland School in early June.

In addition to this exhibition, the Penland Gallery sells work in all craft media made

by the students, instructors, and resident artists of Penland School of Crafts and offers tours of the Penland campus twice each week when classes are in session.

Later in June the Focus Gallery will present the exhibit, *Nathan Blank: Sculptural and Functional Iron*, on view from June 27 through July 27, 2014.

Penland School of Crafts is a national center for craft education dedicated to helping people live creative lives. Located in Western North Carolina, Penland offers workshops in books and paper, clay, drawing and painting, glass, iron, metals, printmaking and letterpress, photography, textiles, and wood. The school also sponsors artists' residencies, an outreach program, and a gallery and visitors center. Penland is a nonprofit, tax-exempt institution which receives support from the North Carolina Arts Council, an agency funded by the State of North Carolina and the National Endowment for the Arts, which believes that a great nation deserves great art.
