ist in Residence position at Jonathan Green Studios. For six years, Charleston's art and cultural community served as inspiration to Reynier, and we are thrilled to welcome him back to our city," says Angela Mack, president and CEO of the Gibbes Museum of Art. "This exhibition will feature works that he made while living in Charleston and will also introduce the community to many of his latest creations.

Llanes, born in 1985 in Pinar del Rio, Cuba, honed his artistic talents at the city's School of Art (Instructores de Arte) under the coaching of renowned realist artist Juan Miguel Suárez before moving to Havana in 2005 to continue his studies. Immigrating to the United States in 2007, Llanes established himself as a prominent artist with exhibitions like Strange Visitor in Naples, FL, and an artist residency at Jonathan Green Studios in Charleston.

Recognized by Oxford American in 2012 as a "New Superstar of Southern Art," Llanes's work, deeply influenced by Southern culture, was featured in a traveling exhibition, The Vibrant Vision Collection, at the Morris Museum in Augusta, GA, and the Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston. With notable solo exhibitions at institutions such as the Butler Institute of American Art and the Polk Museum of Art, Llanes' art now resides in the permanent collections of renowned museums across the country.

Reynier Llanes: Passages features several of the artist's recent large-scale oil paintings, as well as works from earlier in his career including examples of his unique coffee watercolor paintings – a style he has

dubbed "Espressionism." Llanes combines and contrasts scenes from nature and daily life with a mystical and imaginative elegance.

Drawing from his own memories and experience as an artist and immigrant, as well as his studies of literature, history and science, Llanes invites viewers into his unique dreamworlds. His explorations of personal and societal passages, both physical and spiritual, sensitively communicate common threads in humanity.


Redux Contemporary Art Center in Charleston, SC, Offers New Exhibits

The Redux Contemporary Art Center in Charleston, SC, is presenting new exhibi-



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

Since 1984, internationally recognized artists have found a congenial home for their work at Jerald Melberg Gallery. This year marks the gallery's 40th anniversary.

As former curator at the Mint Museum, Melberg's extensive experience laid the

foundation for four decades of success and collaboration with the City of Charlotte and in its Sister City Program in Arequipa, Peru. Jerald Melberg Gallery was founded on the conviction that it would be operated more like a museum than a typical gallery.

During his career Melberg has curated major exhibitions for such artists as Pablo Picasso, Romare Bearden, Robert Motherwell, Wolf Kahn and Dale Chihuly. He has focused on building the careers of the artists he represents, taking their work to the major art fairs in the United States as well as organizing museum exhibitions for them.







The McClellanville Arts Council in McClellanville, SC, is presenting Wax and Fiber, A Beautiful Journey, featuring works by Kathleen V. Stuart, on view through June

Kathleen V. Stuart is an award-winning quilter, specializing in whole-cloth quilts and free form art quilting, who divides her time between teaching, lecturing, and working on quilts she enters in shows. Her work has been shown in the United States, Canada, and Jordan and has been featured in magazines and in videos, with several pieces in private collections including at the Art Institute of Chicago. Originally from Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada, where she explored several different forms of art, however, she always went back to

A few years ago, she discovered encaustic painting and fell in love with that art form. Learning to work with this medium, she has taken several classes from many teachers and has found that her photography integrates nicely into her work. Although she is newer to this medium, she has given lectures on the subject and has taught classes to beginners.

Splitting her time between North Carolina and Georgetown, SC, she and her husband enjoy travel and golf, both of which provide endless inspiration and opportunity to expand her love of art.



Stuart offered the following statement "At the ripe old age of 70, I discovered that I am an artist! Not one trying to impart the wisdom of my years, but rather one who loves to create art. I also found that I have too many ideas and want to try it all. With that said, I have put a restriction on my work... fiber and encaustic...

and I've found limiting my focus has helped me improve in both areas. Fiber is very tactile, and, in that arena, I try to create the natural world."

"Molding and shaping fibers into trees, flowers, and rocks, trying to show the world outside my studio and encouraging the viewer to come closer and touch because it looks so real," adds Stuart, "The other side is hard. Encaustic wax melts, but then hardens capturing a flower, inks, or even a bug. Getting the wax to hold the idea I've created while working with a blow torch is so exciting to me. One little slip and one must start over... sometimes that is a good thing! My next step is to combine both mediums, but that won't be for a while."

The McClellanville Arts Council, located on Pinckney Street in McClellanville, was organized in 1977 by three young women who wanted to bring the ine arts, arts instruction, and cultural activities to the sleepy little fishing village where they had chosen to live. Furthermore, working through the local schools, churches, and fraternal organizations, they hoped to encourage residents to record, preserve, and publicize the unique culture of the coastal area encompassing the northern half of Charleston County, South

In manipulating debris through a variety of media - primarily sculpture, installation, and printmaking - she presents the viewer with an everyday object in an unexpected, new form.



relationship with these materials. Crocheted plastic shopping bags, prints made by inking and pressing found objects, and sculptures and installations created with materials sourced on neighborhood and beach walks and collected at home and work are displayed together to give clues of what future civilizations may view as artifacts from this current period of consumer culture.

Thomas completed her MFA in Studio Art at Memphis College of Art in 2012. Her works have been exhibited in various venues, including at the University of Georgia, Southern Illinois University, Latitude 53 in Alberta, Canada, and Museo del Brigantaggio in Itri, Italy. In 2011, she was selected for a solo exhibition at the Brooks Museum in Memphis, TN, and more recently presented a solo show at the Saul Alexander Gallery in 2023 and exhibited in and curated Recent Remnants, a group show at Summerville's Public Works Art Center in March 2024. Aside from being a practicing artist, Thomas is also a full-time high school art teacher in Summerville, SC.

In his exhibit It Don't Cost Nothin' To Be Nice, Laurens, SC, based artist Doug McAbee presents a collection of colorful drawings on uniquely shaped wood panels, vibrant hollow-form steel sculptures, and site specific drawings with acrylic paint marker. The result is an immersive opportunity for the viewer to walk through the interior of McAbee's mind. Characters from McAbee's imagination create narratives about interpersonal relationships in his ink drawings and steel sculptures. Even his most abstracted imagery is derived from organic forms with recognizable heads, eyes, and feet.

These characters interact within individual works of art and similarities in image, theme, and color begin to form among various works in the exhibition. These relationships are further enhanced with the site-specific murals on the gallery's movable walls. These murals introduce new characters who jump, play, and share stories with one another and create an environment similar to a life-sized illustrated story.




"I was taught the power of laughter and humor by my father, and I seek to channel that power into my creative work," McAbee explains. "Knowing that art has the power to change how people think, I have chosen to communicate positive and hopeful messages to my audience through my work."

Doug McAbee learned to weld at age 7. While his imagination was running wild, his father began teaching him practical construction methods with steel. The sense of play and exploration he valued then is still with him as he creates whimsical and organic drawings and sculptures. McAbee earned his BA and MFA at Winthrop University, and his work has been exhibited in solo and group exhibitions and is part of numerous private and public collections throughout the US. He currently works as Associate Professor of Art at Lander University in Greenwood, SC. He lives out in the middle of nowhere with his family and their dogs and he creates drawings and sculptures when he's not teaching.

Kilgore Condon is among South Carolina's most prolific and respected painters. She is the owner of Greenville's Artbomb Studios. Established in 2001 in the Village of West Greenville, Artbomb launched what is now Greenville's most important arts

It is Kilgore Condon's long standing relationship with the West Village and the changes to the community that she wrestles with in her current work. Birds, Chimney Swifts in particular, appear throughout her work in flocks and as individuals in natural environments. Chimney Swifts are small birds that look somewhat like swallows and are sometimes mixed in with flocks of swallows - they are nothing if not resilient creatures. They originally nested in old tree stumps then wood fence posts. After eastern forests were cut down and wooden fence posts went to the wayside, they adapted to nesting in chimneys. It is the Chimney Sweep's need to find a place to nest, to find net and stillness, that intrigues Kilgore Condon and resonates with her desire to hang on to the simple sound of emptiness.

Kilgore Condon states, "There is a colony of about 75-100 Swifts that swoop

through West Greenville every night in the summer - they tend to catch insects in big loops around the 140 year old oak tree in the heart of the Village. Soon the tree will be cut down and apartments will be erected in its place. I wish this wasn't allowed to happen but I'm hopeful that the Swifts will find homes in the neighborhood where there are still trees."

Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte, NC, Offers Work by Whitfield Lovell

The Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte NC, will present Whitfield Lovell: Passages, curated by Michèle Wije, PhD, on view from June 29 through Sept. 22, 2024.

Consisting of two immersive installations and approximately 30 additional works, Whitfield Lovell: Passages is the most comprehensive exhibition of works by artist Whitfield Lovell.

Lovell (born in 1959) is renowned for his masterful conté crayon portraits and multisensory installations that focus on aspects of African American history, while raising universal questions about identity, memory, and America's collective heritage. The exhibition brings together two of Lovell's major installations, Deep River (2013) and *Visitation: The Richmond Project* (2001), with a selection of freestanding tableaux and works on paper from his acclaimed Kin series (2008–2011) and Spell Suite (2019– 2020), as well as the premiere presentation of his forthcoming Card Pieces II. Through a combination of visual projections, sound, and found objects, as well as examples from Lovell's works on paper, visitors will be enveloped in hidden histories and cultural memory of the African American experi-

The subtitle, *Passages*, also refers to the subject matter of his work, which explores the struggle for equality, physical migration, social progress, and self-sufficiency that have been part of the African American experience. The exhibition includes works from Lovell's past series, Kin (2008-2011), and his newest, The Reds (2021-2022). Audiences will bear witness to works created on luscious, deep crimson paper that evokes warmth, passion, and the sanguine. The Reds are presented alongside two operational telephones that, when their receivers are lifted, emit the familiar and galvanizing refrain of "Lift Every Voice and Sing," the hymn written and set to music by brothers James Weldon Johnson (1871–1938) and J Rosamond Johnson (1873–1954).

Photographs of African Americans taken between the Emancipation Proclamation and the Civil Rights Movement provide inspiration for his work created on paper or salvaged wooden boards. He uses a highly refined portrait style to depict stories of African American individuals' daily lives and extraordinary journeys.

Organized by the American Federation o Arts (AFA) in collaboration with the artist, the exhibition is supported by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) and the Terra Foundation for American Art, the exhibition will fill galleries on Level 3 and Level 4 of Mint Museum Uptown. This is the first exhibition these multisensory installations by Lovell are presented together in

a museum-wide show of this monumental size and scope.

Whitfield Lovell is the recipient of a 2007 MacArthur Foundation Fellowship. colloquially referred to as the "genius grant," and the 2014 National Academy Award for Excellence. Lovell has had solo exhibitions at the Smith College Museum of Art (2011) in Northampton, MA, and The Phillips Collection (2016) in Washington, DC, and he was a featured artist at the opening exhibition of the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, DC. His works are featured in the collections of major museums, including the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; the Metropolitan Museum of Art; the Smithsonian American Art Museum, Washington, DC; the National Museum of African American History and Culture; the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts; the Yale University Art Gallery; the Hunter Museum of American Art; the Brooklyn Museum; the Studio Museum in Harlem, New York; the Seattle Art Museum; and many others.

Michèle Wije, PhD, is a former curator of exhibitions at the American Federation of Arts. She began her career at the Metropolitan Museum of Art and has organized several exhibitions including Sparkling Amazons: Abstract Expressionist Women of the 9th St. Show (2019) and Bisa Butler: Portraits (2020) for the Katonah Museum of Art, Katonah, New York.

The American Federation of Arts is the leader in traveling exhibitions internationally. A nonprofit organization founded in 1909, the AFA is dedicated to enriching the public's experience and understanding of the visual arts through organizing and touring art exhibitions for presentation in museums around the world, publishing exhibition catalogues featuring important scholarly research, and developing educa-

Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts + Culture in Charlotte, NC, Offers Works by Qualeasha Wood

The Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts + Culture at Levine Center for the Arts, in Uptown Charlotte, NC, is presenting Qualeasha Wood: code anima, curated by Leandra-Juliet Kelley, on view through Sept. 22, 2024

Qualeasha Wood: code_anima explores identity, physical and digital boundaries, and the process of individuation through analysis of complex and socially accepted paradoxes. Defined as "an individual's true inner self," anima serves as a leitmotif in Wood's introspective work, which examines the archetypes found within physical and digital societies. As the artist states, "This body of work draws inspiration from the concept of deus ex machina - a narrative device that introduces an unexpected, external force to resolve a complex situation. This device allows us to highlight the paradoxical position of Black women in society - cast simultaneously as both saviors and scapegoats within a white supremacist

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For Wood, "code anima delves into the complexities of identity, expectation, and erasure through the prisms of race, gender, and sexuality. This exhibition is a critical examination of the roles historically ascribed to Black women, which demand both a resolution to systemic issues and the simultaneous stripping of personal autonomy and agency.'

Qualeasha Wood (b. 1996 Long Branch, NJ) is a textile artist whose work contemplates realities around black female embodiment that do and might exist. Inspired by a familial relationship to textiles, queer craft, Microsoft Paint, and internet avatars, Wood's tufted and tapestry pieces mesh traditional craft and contemporary technological materials. She navigates both an Internet environment saturated in Black Femme figures and culture and a political and economic environment holding that embodiment at the margins. Like the vast majority of her age-peers, Wood has operated one mortal and multiple digital avatars since pre-adolescence. For her, intuitive compositional processes make for a contemporary exploration of Black American Femme ontology

While Wood's tapestries blend images from social media with religious, specifically Catholic, iconography, her 'tuftings' represent cartoon-like figures that recall the racist caricatures widespread in popular family programs of the early-mid-20th century and beyond. The tuftings have a distinctly different visual style from the artist's tapestry pieces. In them, Wood adopts a naïve aesthetic that calls on the nostalgia of cartoon animations and their association with racial stereotyping to unpack notions of Black girlhood. Despite their formal simplicity, the tuftings reveal a lurking tension drawn from the artist's own experiences of consuming media rife with anti-Black prejudice throughout her life. Where the

tapestries are absorbed in consumption and cyberculture, the tuftings speak to inherited trauma and necessarily implicate accountability in the viewer.

Wood has exhibited at The Art Institute of Chicago, The Metropolitan Museum of Art (New York), Hauser and Wirth (New York, Los Angeles, and Somerset, UK), Kendra Jayne Patrick (New York), Pippy Houldsworth Gallery, (London), Cooper Cole (Toronto), New Image Art (Los Angeles), and more. Her work is held in institutional collections, such as The Metropolitan Museum of Art, as well as international private collections. Wood lives and works in Brooklyn and Philadelphia, and is represented by Gallery Kendra Jayne Patrick and Pippy Houldsworth Gallery.

Celebrating 50 years, Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts + Culture is a multidisciplinary arts institution located in the heart of Charlotte, NC. Founded in 1974, the Gantt Center's mission is to present, preserve, and celebrate excellence in the art, history, and culture of African-Americans and those of African descent through visual and literary arts, dance, music, film, educational programs, theatre productions, and community outreach. The Gantt Center features fine art exhibitions from around the world and is home to the nationally celebrated John and Vivian Hewitt Collection of African-American Art, which was generously donated by Bank of America and is accessible online. Named for Charlotte civic leader and former mayor Harvey Bernard Gantt, the Gantt Center is housed in an iconic, award-winning structure designed by architect Philip Freelon, co-designer of the Smithsonian National Museum for African American History and Culture (NMAAHC).

Williams offered the following statement, "It begins with a gesture, no plan other than to paint. Guided by instinct and intuition, I explore subjects and materials in an atmosphere of stimulating music that enhances my ability to function creatively and sets my mind at ease. As I work into a rhythm of layering marks and colors, the process unfolds. Each added line, wash, smear, smudge, and scrape has a profound effect on the whole. As a composition begins to emerge, the arduous and often intriguing part of the creative process begins - the analysis."

"What's working? How shall I proceed? I sit and study and give the work a chance to tell me what to do," adds Williams. "If it doesn't speak, I bombard it with more paint, draw on it, scrape it, scratch it or whatever it takes to move the work in a satisfying direction even if that means grinding it down and restarting. I'm an action painter at heart. Action painters act, then think. What I want to make is an exciting painting, unique to me, with lyricism and dynamics drawn from nature and life. I use no formulas to achieve this goal; each piece is characterized by this process and that ensures its authenticity. I do not consider a work complete unless it challenges or advances my understanding

Williams adds, "I was born to be an avid outdoorsman with a love for fishing and a

"While I love every Bonnard and Vuillard painting I see, the Post War Era and the prevailing philosophies of the Avant-garde novement are what I relate to most. 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
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
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

Tema Stauffer is an associate professor of photography at East Tennessee State University, whose work examines the social, economic, and cultural landscape of American spaces.

The gallery's lower level will feature works from Stauffer's 2016-2017 series titled, "Upstate," which portray the lingering legacy of American industrial and agricultural history in and around Hudson,

The upstairs level will showcase works from her "Southern Fiction" series taken between 2018 and 2021, which explore the environments that shaped the imaginations of 20th century Southern writers including Alice Walker, Flannery O'Connor, Eudora Welty, Tennessee Williams and others.

"Upstairs is excited to showcase this exhibition of compelling photographic images presenting in documentary-like fashion, a beautifully, thoughtfully told visual narrative," says show curator, Eldred Hudson. "As the show's title suggests, viewers are given the opportunity to explore the similarities and differences between two geographical regions and topical subjects that deepen one's understanding and interpretation of the American experience."

Stauffer earned her MFA in photography from the University of Illinois at Chicago in 1998. The Penland School of Craft in Penland, NC, will present *Where Water Meets Land*, featuring works by Katie Hudnall, Amy Putansu, and Sarah Vaughn, on view in the Focus Gallery, from June 25 through Aug, 3, 2024.

Woodworker Katie Hudnall grew up along the Potomac River and spent childhood summers on the South Carolina coast. Her fanciful, sometimes functional, sometimes impractical, painted wooden objects are inspired by furniture, illustration, tools, toys, and all things nautical. Hudnall prefers using recycled and found wood whenever possible as it sparks new discoveries and encourages an openness to change and adaptation.

Textile artist Amy Putansu spent her childhood growing up on the Atlantic Ocean along the rugged coast of Maine. Her hand woven "paintings" use a rare weaving technique called ondulé which allows her to manipulate threads into wave-like patterns that suggest the fluidity and movement of water. These contemplative works keep Putansu connected to her heritage and homeland while serving as personal meditations on the impermanence of all things.

Glass artist Sarah Vaughn has always been drawn to rivers, lakes, and anywhere she could become lost in a sea of smooth stones. She creates recollections of rocks, small moments that are not meant to last, in materials that are permanent yet fragile. Her perfectly composed and stacked groupings of glass and porcelain rocks serve as a metaphor for personal experiences and the precarious nature of life.



Blowing Rock, Arts and History Museum in Blowing Rock, NC, is presenting *Two Headed Diver: Lynne Hobaica & Rickie Barnett*, on view in the Schaefer Gallery, through Nov. 2, 2024.

Two Headed Diver: Lynn Hobaica and Rickie Barnett is an exhibition in three entangled parts, featuring the individual yet mutually-informed studio practices of Lynne Hobaica, Rickie Barnett, and their collaborative work under the moniker "Two Headed Diver." Their characters - often simultaneously fantastic and mundane - are produced through a heady concoction of personal myth-making, morality tale, and a

distinct sense of New World wonder.

Both artists' work is driven by narrative, though their singular approaches to storytelling are often pleasantly obscured by layered surface treatments and enigmatic

ring patterns and decorative elements to elevate seemingly humble or alien subjects - chihuahuas and antlered beasts seen here, for example. While gauzy glazes and sheer fabrics shroud her characters in a fog that reinforces an almost mythological interpretation of them. Working in both ceramic and textile, Hobaica's compositions prioritize the inexplicability of the human experience.

Barnett's figurative sculptures, while less ambiguous in their surface treatment, are just as wonderfully confounding. Often rendered in gravity-defying arrangements or seemingly comical isolation, the characters populating his tableaus represent the lessons of folktales and a life lived in all its comedy and trauma. When Barnett's and Hobaica's sensibilities are brought together in a single object, their intuitive and deeply collaborative approach to shared making crystallizes their complementary humor and empathy. The results are acutely humane observations of the prosaic that encourage observation and, hopefully, a mutual vulnerability with


Blowing Rock Art & History Museum in Blowing Rock, NC, Features Works by Maud Gatewood

BRAHM Board of Trustees President Dean Hamric notes, "I am thrilled that BRAHM is sharing the life and work of this important North Carolina artist. Maud had a huge impact on the art scene in our state, and she was also a friend. This exhibition is deeply personal to me, and I invite all to visit Blowing Rock to immerse yourself in this exhibition as well as the High Country

The Hard Edge & The Soft Line is a major undertaking by the Museum. It is a comprehensive examination of Gatewood's career, showing the evolution of her work as well as her significant contributions, as an artist and educator, to painting in North Carolina and the region.

"We are preparing for the exhibition in earnest and creating a lively season of public programs. Additionally, BRAHM is building a permanent digital wing devoted to this artist," Stephan Dragisic, Teresa & Don Caine Executive Director at BRAHM, said. "Gatewood's life and work will be shared beyond those who see this exhibition in person, so we are working to create a robust timeline of her life and share an evergrowing collection of digital repositories of her works. Southern Highlands Craft Guild in Asheville, NC, Offers Works by **Haywood Community College Graduates**





became the first in her family to attend college. Her fine-art education was markedly shaped by Black visionaries like artists Jules Allen and Deborah Jack. Through their introduction and from Clarke's self-motivation, she discovered artists like sculptor Maren Hassinger and interdisciplinary artist Adrian Piper, who share a similar interest in conceptualizing the body.

Originally a photographer, Clarke slips between several mediums to disclose the conflicted, inherited, and politicized histories of materials associated with Black culture. "My work contends with the complexity of my articulation as a subject," Clarke elaborates, adding that by investigating herself and these materials, she unravels "a presence intertwined with shame, violence, and generational trauma." Motivated by a desire to heal and "an insistence upon freedom," Clarke produces art envisioning tomorrow, where bodies are not constrained by prevailing structures.

In this exhibition, Clarke's sculptures, including her largest hair-bonding glue sculpture to date, call attention to the multifaceted layers of language while engaging and interrogating the principle of controlling one's body. At a moment of distinct polarization, Clarke invites viewers to surpass their subjectivity and engage in the tender act of looking and listening.







Craven Allen Gallery in Durham, NC, Offers Works by Renzo Ortega

Craven Allen Gallery in Durham, NC, is presenting Renzo Ortega: Acts of Serenity, on view through July 13, 2024.

Renzo Ortega is a contemporary painter who is also a performer, musician (of techno cumbia and punk rock) and an installation artist. Best known for his fantastical compositions which incorporate elements of mythology and popular culture, Ortega takes an entirely different approach for Acts of Serenity, turning the tradition of still life painting into a meditative practice.

Ortega begins by carefully arranging and lighting the objects on a specially constructed set in his studio. He paints in silence, integrating his breath and posture with the act of applying pigment on linen. With their subtle color gradations and painterly qualities the still-lifes showcase the mastery and immediacy of his technique, and reference inspirations both historic and contemporary. In Nirvana, an old pair of Converse sneakers and a guitar pedal become a monument to Kurt Kobain, while a hat and tulip in another honor Van Gogh's Spirit.

Ortega is well known for his engaging and insightful artist talks. The public is invited to The Power of Painting: Renzo Ortega in conversation with painter James Keul, at the gallery, on June 22, at 4pm.

Born in Peru and based in Carrboro, NC, Ortega received a BFA in painting from the Escuela Nacional de Bellas Artes del Peru (1999), studied at the Art Students League of New York (2000-04) and received his MFA in painting from Hunter College (2014). He has shown widely at galleries and museums, including the recent show at the Nasher showcasing major artists working in North Carolina. He was Artist-in-Residence at the Rubenstein Arts Center at Duke University, and was the inaugural artist of the New Wave Art artist-in-residence program in West Palm Beach. Ortega is also a devoted painting and drawing teacher and has been a Visiting Lecturer at UNC Chapel Hill and a Brock Family Visiting Studio Arts Instructor at Duke University.

On April 5, 1947, their grassroots vision was supported by a public appropriation of \$1 million from the North Carolina General Assembly and later matched with a gift of 70+ works of art from the Samuel H. Our African and Indigenous ancestry endows hair with significance beyond physical beauty; our long flowing braids are a conduit for ritual anointing, a symbol of tribe and belonging, and a method for intergenerational bonding," says Samantha Everette. Inspired by her own experiences and by the Black women who make up her closest friends and family, Everette creates a scene that highlights their strength and beauty through the ritual of hair braiding.

A ritual experienced around the world, the women tightly encircle Zya - a deeply intimate expression of sisterhood and inter-generational connection. Dressed in white, reminiscent of those worn by Orisha and Houdoun priestesses throughout the Diaspora. As the braiders slowly, patiently create this elaborate East African braided style and Zya and the braids extend out in their splendor, she rises higher on a pedestal in strength and confidence. Taking hours or even days to complete, braiding is a labor of love, patience, and artistic precision resulting in a breathtak-

Crowning Glory tells the story of sisterhood, motherhood, community, collective care, triumph, and the complex elixir of beauty and spiritual mystique car-



ried by Black women, atop our heads and within our beings.

Samantha Everette is a lifelong artist, designer, world traveler and photographer. She is a Durham, NC, native and graduated Summa Cum Laude from North Carolina State with a BA in Industrial Design. After graduating she spent ten years as a shoe designer. As a designer, Everette spent half of the year living in China and traveling throughout Asia. She was inspired to capture the world around

CAM Raleigh in Raleigh, NC, Offers Works by UNC Chapel Hill **MFA Art Students**

Contemporary Art Museum of Raleigh in Raleigh, NC, is presenting UNC Chapel Hill MFA Thesis Exhibitions, on view in the CAM Lower Level Gallery, through Sept.

8, 2024. The Department of Art and Art History at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the Contemporary Art Museum of Raleigh is proud to present four Masters of Fine Arts thesis exhibitions: Mark Anthony Brown Jr., Molly English, Matthew Troyer and Vera Weinfield.

The MFA Thesis Exhibition is the culmination of an intensive two-year degree program in the visual arts driven by individual research. The program encourages interdisciplinary practice and experimentation. The four graduating artists present individual thesis exhibitions that each explore focused themes and materials, utilizing mediums ranging from painting and sculpture to photography and textiles.

In her thesis exhibition, Sap, Molly English invites viewers into a candycolored world of tufted forms. Her large, lush tapestries feature hybrid characters that violently transform from panel to panel, fusing and severing the bodies of artist, animal, and land. Part bestiary, part blood ritual, Sap seeks to excise spiritual substance from these embodied relationships, using narrative tapestry as a meaning-making form. Doing so reimagines the possibilities of a story told through fiber, rejecting the flattening warp and weft of the loom in order to embrace the wild textures of the ignoble tufting gun. In this way, English tends to Western tapestry's history of justifying state and religious dominance both in form and content, opting instead to tell a story in which justification itself is questioned.

From English's own lived and researched understandings of Irish Catholicism, Anarchism, Feminism, and Animism, the work grapples with the fallibility and necessity of liberatory and salvatory beliefs in a nihilistic world. Sap invites guests to navigate these struggles through their sense of touch, and to experience tactility as an intimate layer of the story. Like a secret shared through tender contact, Sap guides the audience through an exploration of faith and fiber - the ways in which they hold together and fall apart.

Melancholia, nostalgia and sentimentality are just a few of the feelings that a photograph can evoke. Mark Anthony Brown Jr.'s thesis exhibition, reminiscer, expands on this phenomena - the potential of the physical photograph as a conduit for memory and emotion. Utilizing materials from a range of archives - his own family photos, institutional archives and "found" photos & objects - Brown Jr. upends notions of what constitutes a "proper" archival practice and expands on vernacular visual language. His work asks viewers to consider the vernacular as a visual language, that is more expensive than just the consideration of vernacular photographs, and to include notions of aesthetics, symbols and a shared

In the ongoing photographic series by Matthew Troyer, The Uniformed States of America documents the commodification of military surplus garments, initially designed for warfare and financed by tax dollars, as they transition from instruments of conflict to symbols in a consumer-driven context.

This visual exploration unfolds within surplus stores nationwide, capturing scenes of individuals, artifacts, and the retail environments that facilitate the peculiar life cycle of these garments.

The series critically examines surplus stores' cultural impact and aesthetic allure, offering a contemplative narrative on the commodification of war gear, and the remnants of warfare embedded in these commercialized artifacts. From depicting store interiors to individuals interacting with these repurposed military materials, this series illuminates the multifaceted dynamics surrounding surplus stores and the oddity of garments born from conflict, finding a second life in the civilian domain.

Through drawing, installation, puppetry performance and video, Vera Weinfield investigates the normalization and repression of trauma, its lingering effects and repercussions within generations of North American Jews. In her thesis exhibition, *Unraveling* The Threads, Weinfield uses masks and puppets to explore embodied traumas, embedding mundane domestic objects and spaces with antisemitic archetypes that ask the viewer to consider what happens when trauma becomes an integral part of one's

Weinfield pieces together familial and cultural archives and myths. In these works, oral, written, and visual histories morph into an anthropomorphized time and space in which Jewish pack peddlers, matriarchs and daughters-left-behind simultaneously confront and hide from what haunts them. In collaboration with Greensboro, NC, based artist, Terri Jones, Weinfield explores how Jewish and Black North American diasporic histories collide in complex, messy and performances, inspired by a deep research process into Jewish and Black southern histories, family and cultural myth, and their own internalized generational traumas, Jones and Weinfield unravel these threads and in doing so find themselves tangled up inside of them.

Molly English (b. 1993) is an artist from Chicagoland. She received her BA in studio art and poetry from Columbia College Chicago in 2016, and will receive her MFA in Studio Art from the University of North Carolina in 2024. In her work, English reimagines the traditional flatness of narrative tapestry as a more abundant form - one that positions faith as both a necessary and fallible mode of relating to an increasingly nihilistic world. Mark Anthony Brown Jr. (b. 1991), is

a journeyman of sorts. Not dedicated to a single given location for too long, he currently lives and works between Cincinnati, OH, Durham, NC, and Atlanta, GA. Brown Jr. has received a Bachelor of Science Technology from Bowling Green State

University and is currently in pursuit of a MFA from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill where also is a fellow in Museum Practice at The Ackland Art Museum. Brown Jr.'s art practice is research driven and interdisciplinary; utilizing photography, sculpture, drawing and painting with an interest in vernacular aesthetic practices and sensibilities, the manifestation of African retentions in the diaspora, semiotics and archival practices.

His work has been exhibited nationally; including the Cincinnati Art Museum, Mint Gallery in Atlanta, GA, and Block Gallery in Raleigh, NC. Brown Jr. has received various fellowships and awards including an Emerging Lens Fellowship from ArtWORKS in Chicago (2022), the Nexus Grant from Atlanta Contemporary (2022), and a Visiting Researcher Fellowship at Wilson Special Collection Library at University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

Matthew Troyer (b. 1988) is an American artist and former US Marine Corps Combat Photographer. Serving actively for nine years, he transitioned from the military to earn his Bachelor of Fine Art in Photography and Imaging with Honors from Ringling College of Art and Design in 2022. He is attending the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he will receive his Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art in 2024.

In his work, Trover examines the intricate relationship between war and American culture. By illuminating these dimensions of American life, he invites viewers to

participate in nuanced discussions about the profound implications for society at large. In this endeavor, Troyer aims to investigate prevailing narratives, disrupt conventional depictions, and nurture a deeper understanding of the complexities inherent in the convergence of war and culture.

Vera Weinfield (b. 1992) was raised in Indiana. She graduated from the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts with a BFA in painting in 2014. Before entering the MFA program at the University of North Carolina, Weinfield collaborated with the Greensboro Mural Collective, in Greensboro, NC, and worked for several years as a community artist with Los Muralistas de El Puente, an intergenerational mural collective based in Brooklyn. In collaboration with other artists and within her individual art practice, Weinfield invents mythical, political, and psychological narratives that investigate the slippages between 'good' and 'evil,' Jew and Gentile, man and woman, animal and human, victim and oppressor.

Terri Jones (b. 1992), a Greensboro, NC, native and Guilford College Fine Arts graduate, navigates her multifaceted identity as a painter, educator, community muralist, and mother of three. As an elementary school art teacher, she nurtures young talent while honing her own craft. Beyond the classroom, Jones's impact extends to the streets, where her murals serve as narratives of collective identity

Focusing intently on small groups of works, the artist spotlight series features engaging profiles of artists held in the Gibbes permanent collection. The rotating series launched with Abstract Expressionist painters, Merton D. Simpson and William M. Halsev. Both artists born and raised in South Carolina had long and successful careers in the arts - Simpson in New York and Halsey in Charleston. Galleries 8 & 9, Through Sept. 15 - "Reynier Llanes: Passages" The exhibition presents the vibrant narrative paintings of Reynier Llanes an established Cuban artist (Pinar del Rio, 1985) now based in the United States. Llanes combines and contrasts scenes from nature and daily life with a mystical and imaginative elegance. Drawing from his own memories and experience as an artist. an émigré, and an immigrant as well as his studies of literature, history, and science, Llanes's invites viewers into unique dreamworlds. His explorations of personal and societal passages, both physical and spiritual, sensitively communicate common threads in humanity. Currently living in Miami, Llanes spent 6 years working in Charleston. This exhibition pulls from the artist's recent series of large-scale oil paintings, as well as his unique coffee watercolor paintings - a style he has dubbed Espressionism.

Galleries 1, 4, and 5, Permanent Exhibition -"18th and 19th Century American Paintings and Sculpture". American paintings, from colonial portraits to Civil War-era landscapes, occupy the Gibbes Main Gallery. Portraits of leading political, social, and military figures include works by Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Benjamin West, Gilbert Stuart, Thomas Sully and Samuel F.B. Morse. The gallery also features landscape and genre scenes by Angelica Kaufmann, Louis Mignot, Eastman Johnson, Conrad Wise Chapman, and William Aiken Walker. The paintings collection is complemented by examples of neoclassical sculpture on view in the Campbell Rotunda, and decorative art objects on loan from the Rivers Collection. At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints. Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest n American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of art in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition - "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and the lowcountry region. Works in this gallery were created over the past forty years by artists who are native to the area, who have worked here, or who have created objects that reflect the complex story of the region. 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



Born in Brooklyn, NY in 1920, Krisel's interest in art and design started at a young age. He attended the American Artist School in New York city as a teenager where he met renowned modern artists, including Piet Mondrian, who greatly influenced his abstract style. After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following year he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor, Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. Bechtler Museum of Modern Art, Levine Center for the Arts, 420 South Tryon St., Charlotte. **Through June 2 -** "Hildur Ásgeirsdóttir Jónsson: Infinite Space, Sublime Horizons". Born and raised in Iceland, Hildur Ásgeirsdóttir Jónsson (b. 1963) has spent the last 30 years developing a unique practice that melds the disciplines of painting, weaving, and drawing, creating an innovative and labor-intensive body of work that blurs the boundaries between abstraction and representation, and fine art and craft. Based on the captivating landscape and skies of Iceland, her work is deeply rooted in environmental subjects and concerns while also contributing to art historical discourses on landscape painting and postwar abstraction. Organized by the Frederick R. Weisman Museum of Art at Pepperdine University, this exhibition will feature large-scale paintings created on a loom and more intimate watercolors and drawings. Through June 2 - "On the Horizon: Landscapes from the Collection". This exhibition features work by nearly twenty artists from the museum's collection that explore diverse approaches to depicting landscapes. Artists like Isabel Quintanilla, Markus Raetz, and Italo Valenti portray idyllic scenes; in contrast, Paul Harcharik explores the grim impact of industrialization. Other artists including Nicolas de Staël, Maria Helena Vieira da Silva, and Zao Wou-Ki push the boundaries of traditional landscapes with wholly abstract compositions. With works spanning over fifty years, "On the Horizon: Landscapes from the Collection" delves into artists' varied engagements with the natural world and evolving environments. Through Aug. 9 - "Eduardo Chillida: 100 Years". This exhibtion commemorates the centenary of the influential Spanish sculptor Eduardo Chillida (1924-2002). Presenting a selection of sculptures and works on paper from the Bechtler Museum's permanent collection, this intimate exhibition offers a focused look at the artist's pioneering and varied practice. Renowned for his monumental sculptures, Chillida also created domestically-scaled sculptures, drawings. collages, and prints, examples of which will be on view. Together these works illustrate the great influence that Chillida's upbringing in the Basque region of Spain and his early training in architecture had on his unique artistic vision, and demonstrate his enduring exploration of space, light, form, and material. Through Aug. 9 - "Alyson Shotz: Coalescence". Blurring the boundaries between art and science, American artist Alyson Shotz (born 1964) is widely acdaimed for her sculptures and installations tha I use synthetic materials such as glass, mirrors, plastic, and stainless steel to harness intangible forces of the natural world like gravity, space. and light. On loan from the Bank of America Collection, this single-work installation is a dazzling sculpture made of glass beads and wire that hangs from the ceiling, "Coalescence" (2006) resembles a hovering cloud, a massive spider web glistening with morning dew, or a cluster of atoms magnified to monumental scale. Its open form challenges traditional notions of sculpture as grounded, solid, or weighty, and reveals Shotz's abiding interest in perception: calling attention to the relationship between an artwork, the viewer, and the space they share. Ongoing - The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art is named after the family of Andreas Bechtler, a Charlotte residen and native of Switzerland who assembled and inherited a collection of more than 1,400 artworks created by major figures of 20th-century modernism and donated it to the public trust.

The Delhom Service League (DSL) provided a half-century of generous support and impactful initiatives to The Mint Museum, helping to fund the acquisition of more than 200 works of art in the Mint's collection. The Delhom Service League: 50 Golden Years celebrates the Delhom Service League's enthusiastic support for the Mint by proudly displaying significant works funded or gifted by the affiliate group, plus selected publications, photographs and other memorabilia. In 2022, the Delhom Service League made the difficult decision to dissolve as a Mint affiliate. The league nevertheless remains an indelible part of the Mint's history, and its many contributions rightly deserve the museum's never-ending recognition and gratitude. In 1965, The Mint Museum purchased the exceptional collection of British, European, and Asian ceramics from Chicago collector M. Mellanay Delhom. Two years later, once the museum finished building a new wing that included a large gallery to display her holdings. Miss Delhom - as she preferred to be called - began offering weekly classes, open to the public, to discuss the works on view. Ongoing - "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". From crocks, jars, and jugs to pitchers, candleholders, and vases, "turning pots" is one of the oldest and richest craft traditions in North Carolina. For more than 200 years, members of the Cole family have been potting in central North Carolina — Randolph, Moore. Lee, and Montgomery counties. Six generations of Coles, and no fewer than 18 individuals, are represented in The Mint Museum's permanent collection. More than 60 highlights of their wares are included in the installation "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". One reason for its long-term success is that making pottery has so often been a family tradition in the state. Fathers taught the art of forming, glazing, and firing clay objects to their sons, and in later generations also to daughters, who in turn taught their children, and so on through the decades. These family dynasties not only helped to keep the potting craft alive, but ensured continuity in techniques and craftsmanship, as well as introduced artistic innovations in succeeding generations. "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters" presents a visual history of "turned pots" and the family that helped turn North Carolina into one of America's centers for handmade, traditional pottery. Embracing the times in which she lived, Cunningham (1883–1976) created images that reflect crucial movements and developments in art and photography during her 70-year career. Her photographs, seductive and dynamic, are inspired by a multitude of genres, including portraiture, family photographs, still lifes and street photography. Maya Angelou's poem "Still I Rise," published in 1978, was an assertion of dignity and resilience in the face of oppression. In the 1980s, Angelou used Reynolda as her stage, sharing words of humanity, survival, and triumph. But before her, numerous Black lives impacted and intersected with the story of Reynolda.
