

College of Charleston, SC, Features Works by Demond Melancon

The College of Charleston, SC, is presenting the first solo exhibition entitled, *Demond Melancon: As Any Means Are Necessary*, on view at the Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art, through Dec. 7, 2024.

New Orleans-based artist Demond Melancon, also known as Big Chief Demond Melancon of the Young Seminole Hunters, works solely with a needle and thread to sew glass beads onto canvas, beginning this practice in 1992 when he first became part of a more than 200-year-old culture known as the Black Masking Culture of New Orleans.

Melancon is well known for creating massive suits as a Black Masker, notably seen during Mardi Gras, which are sculptural forms based on the size of his body and are composed of intricate, hand-sewn beadwork revealing a collective visual narrative. In 2017, Melancon pioneered an emerging contemporary art practice using the same beading techniques he's refined over the past 30 years in the Black Masking Culture.

Demond Melancon: As Any Means Are Necessary will feature suit aprons, beaded portraits and other new works, including a new sculpture of an experimental "spirit suit" that is a smaller-scale companion to the suit that Melancon will mask in 2025.

Melancon is widely known for his

appearance in All on a Mardi Gras Day: Big Chief Demond of the Young Seminole Hunters. This intimate documentary touches on the social and cultural significance of the Black Masking Culture of New Orleans and how the city is everchanging. It was accepted into over 40 film festivals in 12 countries and nominated for Best Short Film at the Berlinale and Best Documentary Short at the Tribeca Film Festival, two of the most prestigious film festivals in the world. With key grand prize wins at three Oscar-qualifying film festivals in Seattle, Rhode Island and Australia, the documentary short went on to be qualified for an Academy Award in 2020. A film screening will be held at the Halsey on Nov. 19.

The Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art at the College of Charleston provides a multidisciplinary laboratory for the production, presentation, interpretation and dissemination of ideas by innovative visual artists from around the world. As a non-collecting museum, we create meaningful interactions between adventurous artists and diverse communities within a context that emphasizes the historical, social and cultural importance of the art of our time.

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Originally from Cheshire, UK, Alan Sherlock has over 35 years of professional photography experience. City of North Charleston, SC, Offers Works by Kirsten Hoving, JD Clark, and Mahmood Fazal

The City of North Charleston, SC, features three concurrent exhibits by Kirsten Hoving, JD Clark, and Mahmood Fazal, on view in the Park Circle Gallery, from Sept. 4 - 28, 2024. A reception will be held on Sept. 6, from 5-7pm.

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce that concurrent solo exhibitions of photo-based multimedia works by Kirsten Hoving (Charleston, SC) and mixed media works by JD Clark (Sullivans Island, SC) featuring Polaroid photographs by Mahmood Fazal (Charleston, SC).

In her exhibit Fabricated Visions, Charleston-based artist Kirsten Hoving presents a collection of evocative photographs on silk or plastic combined with secondary photographs or paper collage. In some works, the fabric is mounted at the top over a digital underprint on a panel to create free-flowing photographs that gently move with air currents or in response to the movements of viewers.

In others, an image on clear plastic is stabilized on a transparent substrate that, in turn, is lifted over a secondary digital photograph or hand-made paper collage to create an unexpected three-dimensional effect. Hoving's combination of photographs with silk fabric, plastic, paper, and more creates mysterious images that allude to poems, myths, and transcendent experiences.

Although Hoving's subjects are quietly commonplace – a ladder propped against an apple tree, a figure entering a doorway, a swimmer lifting an arm – she presents them in unusual ways that elevate them to poetic visions. "My materials and processes support the metaphors in my work," Hoving explains. "Silk and plastic, whether flowing or three-dimensional, provide the underpinning for imaginative musings and fabricated visions."

Hoving is a photographer and multimedia artist whose art balances on the edge between fact and fiction. Over the last sixteen years she has shown her work in numerous galleries both locally and abroad and has published several books, including Svala's Saga, a project done in collaboration with photographer Emma

Powell. With a PhD in Art History from Columbia University, Hoving had a long career as a professor and scholar of modern art, with books and articles on many topics, including Surrealist photography and the assemblages of Joseph Cornell. Those interests inform her creative practice.

From Corporate to Creative is an exhibition featuring collaborative works that combine Polaroids taken by photographer Mahmood Fazal with sketches created by former corporate executive turned street artist, JD Clark. Each piece is a fun and nostalgic composition of imagineered art that draws interest and study, capturing scenes from the eyes of a person working the stables, fishing the docks, hitting the streets, hiking the trails, and experiencing the drama of American life at a visceral level.

"It starts with a Polaroid," Clark explains. "Sometimes it's Mahmood's idea, sometimes it's mine, and other times it's mutual. The charcoal sketch begins on location where the Polaroid photograph was taken. Sometimes I complete the sketch in the studio with oil paint, pastel, or other media added to the charcoal." This collaboration originated as an effort to challenge one another's creativity and offered the artists an opportunity to both receive and provide constructive criticism of each other's work, resulting in more mutual value and personal satisfaction.

Clark grew up in lake country in the north central Midwest and Great Lakes. He retired from a 35-year business career in 2013 and began a new career as an artist in 2017. After making and selling art on the streets of Charleston, he began selling direct to customers at Charleston's City Market in 2018 and hasn't looked back. His work has been shown at the Piccolo Spoleto juried art show, North Charleston Art Fest, and the Old Exchange Building. The Exchange Building

Mahmood Fazal is a photographer, illustrator, and former director of the Charleston Center for Photography. He was born in Lahore, Pakistan, and grew up in Kuwait before moving to the US for college. While growing up, he was inspired by his uncle who practiced photography as a hobby. That was when he picked up a camera and began his photography journey. Over the years, he has photographed weddings and families, done commercial photography, art reproduction, artistic photography, and photo

illustration.

"This retrospective is my visual memoir," says Altman, explaining that the show tells her story with an honest voice and without fear of failure. "Allowing myself to be vulnerable, allowing myself to make mistakes with emotional credibility, is critical to my painting."

"Susan Altman is a part of our DNA as a gallery," says Meyer Vogl Gallery Co-Owner and Director Katie Geer. "We've been through so much together - the death of her husband, who was the love of her life; her personal health battles. Making art has gotten her through it all."

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
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Artists 4 Democracy was founded in 2017 in the spirit of radical practicality to bring together artists, art educators, and students to protect democracy by mobilizing the art community for political action and civic engagement.

Through art-making workshops, campus activities, voter registration drives, artist talks, art sales, fundraisers, canvassing, and political events, we foster and protect our participatory democracy.

In 2018, we began our partnership with student bodies and witnessed firsthand how even small engagements can bring big results. In part thanks to our voter registration and GOTV efforts, the student voter turnout at CalArts (California Institute for the Arts) increased by 43.8% from the previous midterm election, helping to flip two red Congressional districts blue.

In 2020, we took our efforts nationwide. We forged partnerships with art schools throughout the country with the goal of inspiring students to vote through a series of hugely popular online artist talks with internationally renowned artists including Laura Owens, Christina Quarles, Lauren Halsey, Amir Fallah, and Ruben Ochoa. We used our online platform to encourage civic engagement and provided students with practical information about how, why, and where to vote.

Artists 4 Democracy has also built expansive and ongoing partnerships with grassroots organizations across the country, including ADVICE, Walk the Walk, Phone Banking with Artists, Swing Left, and Vote Nevada.

As we approach the elections of 2024, we do so with a renewed sense of urgency. The push for anti-democratic legislation at the local and state level, paired with the rollback of personal freedoms and privacy laws surrounding abortion, make it even more imperative that we mobilize people, especially young folks and first-time voters. This year, we are partnering with colleges, universities, and community organizations in California, Nevada, and other key states to get out the vote. Through hands-on art workshops, we combine voter education with creative, engaging activities—everything from zine-making to tote bag stenciling.

As a multilateral network, the art community is uniquely poised to instigate change. Artists have the potential to reach a broad section of people across the country, and share skills suited to providing a creative approach to the pressing issues of climate change, income and gender inequality, healthcare, criminal justice, and voting rights. Artists 4 Democracy believes that by fostering this sense of empowerment in young artists, they will use their creativity to become active forces for positive political and social change.

Cautious tentative marks are a sign of fear and anxiety. That is what is conveyed to the viewer; my expressive images are created without rules or boundaries.

field. It read, 'At some point in your childhood, you and your friends went outside to play together for the last time, and nobody knew it.' There are so many moments that were 'our last' from a particular season in time, and it's fun to reflect on those or bask in the nostalgia. These new paintings include hints of nostalgia and symbolism that directly link to my personal relationship with the fleeting nature of time."

"As an artist, adding narrative elements or symbolism to my work is more attractive than it's ever been," Hall shares. "While I love exploring landscape painting, there are too many ideas filling my head that can only be achieved by expanding my work down this new path. Incorporating more contemporary elements into my work feels exciting and allows for a wider spectrum of storytell-

In one such narrative piece titled Safety Ladder a large 30" x 40" oil painting, the viewer finds a bright green diving board with just to top of a ladder next to it. The foreground elements contrast the vast tumultuous ocean beyond.

Nature remains a profound source of inspiration for Hall. "Nature has this incredible, almost restorative function in how it affects my mental state. Sometimes I think that immersing ourselves in nature taps into some genetic memory from our ancestors. Whether I'm out hiking or in the ocean, it feels like a digital detox. I'm not looking at my phone or thinking about business; instead, I'm dialed into my surroundings. There is another aspect of being in nature that reminds me of my childhood, which grounds and refreshes me. Exploring the landscape always yields a return of inspiration that overflows into my art practice.'

Hall reflects on his creative process, saying, "Rick Rubin once said in an interview that 'a big part of an artist's success is having great discernment,' and I really believe that's true. I've thought a lot recently about how my past as a designer is constantly infused into my painting process. All of my years of curating designs and building a strong sense of composition spill over into how I choose what to paint. Even the palette I choose is influenced by my years in graphic design. The state of my studio sometimes feels like a scene from a crime movie, with all these images and post-it notes stuck on the wall. Having visual ideas and inspiration around is crucial for my process. Sometimes that inspiration comes from experiencing live music or just playing in the backyard with my three kids."

He continues, "On the technical side, my process has changed a lot with the addition of new surfaces like copper panels and tools like screen-printing squeegees. Adding new, unfamiliar tools to my studio helps me think outside the box and avoid becoming too comfortable."

"Adam Hall's latest collection masterfully bridges the timeless beauty of nature with fresh, contemporary elements. His ability to infuse traditional landscapes with modern symbolism and narrative depth offers viewers a unique and captivating experience. Each piece invites us to not

only appreciate the natural world but also to reflect on our own fleeting moments within it," said gallery owner Robert Lange when asked about this new body of work.



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
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

Furman University in Greenville, | Greenville Technical College in Green, SC, Features Works by Robert Finkel

Greenville Technical College in Greer, SC, is presenting Robert Finkel: Design & Photography, on view in the Benson Campus Galleries, through Sept. 27, 2024.

This is an exhibition that speaks to the symbiotic relationship of graphic art and fine art. This symbiotic relationship applies to both the production process and the ultimate goal of them both. The study and realization of all art begins with the basic principles and elements of design. Design is essential to the process that results in a completed photograph, painting, logo, sign (any final product of graphic or fine art). Design provides the tools for any designer or artist to achieve their ultimate goal, communication of a message or an idea or an experience. Finkel states "The best design speaks to both the head and the heart."

Robert Finkel's Design & Photography, features multiple 15 x 22 inch panels, narrates Finkel's process in developing an identity for a historical foundation, developing a brand identity for a restaurant, and editing the collection of IBM's in house posters created during the 60s, 70s, and 80s at its Design Center in Boulder, CO. All three projects begin with historical research and a study of place.

Finkel explains, "This dialogue always involves the project stakeholders, their audience, and myself to help clarify concrete project goals. However, the process also engages with history and culture to identify shared values and traditions. The sum of this knowledge becomes the foundation for a meaningful design that avoids the pitfalls of contemporary trends or surface aesthet-

Finkel's appreciation of cultural history and its utilitarian objects, plus his sense of place are integral to his design practice. They are also integral to his instant print (Polaroid type) photographs. Robert Finkel: Design & Photography includes 30 instant print photographs framed singly or in diptych or triptych formats. According to

Finkel, "This body of work is inspired by two major artistic sources: the photographic sense of place created by photographers such as William Christenberry, William Eggleston, and Walker Evans and the collecting and recontextualization of vernacular lettering by graphic designer Ed Fella and the painter Ed Ruscha."

Robert Finkel is an Associate Professor and Program Chair of Graphic Design at Auburn University. His creative work has earned recognition from Communication Arts, PRINT Regional Design Annual, Creative Quarterly, Graphis, GDUSA, and *UCDA*. He is the co-author of the book The IBM Poster Program: Visual Memoranda, published by Lund Humphries

Finkel was awarded a design fellowship from the Alabama State Council for the Arts to pursue lettering and type design based on his photography of vernacular signage. He is a graduate of the Portfolio Center in Atlanta, GA, and holds a Master of Fine Arts from the University of Florida. His career



Art & Light Greenville, SC, will present *Maximalist Playground*, featuring works by Olivia Bonilla (Charleston, SC) and Liz Rundorff Smith (Travelers Rest, SC), on view from Sept. 3 - 28, 2024. A reception will be held on Sept. 6, from 6-8pm.

Olivia Bonilla is a sculptor who works with cement and resin to create work that gives confectionary pop art a contemporary twist. Using unconventional materials and an inventive approach to color theory, Bonilla combines the notions of nostalgia and indulgence with forms that reference candy, toy culture, and 80's and 90's pop trends. She is interested in the idea of excess in today's consumer driven society. Bonilla fabricates objects like sprinkled pills, oversized diamonds, and vintage toys repeatedly to reflect a world of over stimulation and appropriation. The forms are brightly colored, splashed with glitter and finished in a wet gloss resin finish.

Liz Rundorff Smith is a painter who works in the oil and encaustic mediums. Her work elevates the mundane, mimicking the way we bring significance to loss with keepsakes and memorials. Rundorff Smith wants to create work that evokes a sense of nostalgia and exposes the sentimentality in memory. Her color choice is tied to the decor and design trends of decades past that have become kitschy artifacts. Shapes intimate objects that are no longer identifiable but retain familiarity and reference

urns, shrines, and places of veneration. Embellishments like fringe and shiny gold finishes play into kitsch, recalling party decorations, parade floats and prize ribbons and elevating the ordinary to something to be celebrated.

For Bonilla and Rundorff Smith repetition is important both formally, in the reiteration of forms and sequencing of color and conceptually, in the connection to mass-production, consumerism and the reference to the structure of the grid in art historical context. The work leans into the more is more aesthetic of maximalist design with a focus on bold colors, patterns and objects. Together, their work acts as a playful 1980s form of maximalism that acknowledges a minimalist love of the grid and repetition while celebrating decadence and indulgence.

glass maker, and I exercise as artists. We not only do this individually, but we have found further expression in combining our work for this exhibition."

The exhibit will include about a dozen of Martin's fused glass bowls, platters and decorative panels along with 16 to 18 of Story's most recent paintings, ranging from her typical mountain and marsh scenes to her fascination with farm animals.

"We want to show that the fusion of diversely fashioned works of art in a setting can complement each other, adding to their vitality and beauty," Martin says. "We want the visitors to get joy in seeing a fusion of color, texture and shape that display imagination and ingenuity in a beautiful way. This exhibition points out the diverse ways color and shape can be fashioned in 2-D and 3-D media. Also, how they can be used together to complement each other for decorative purposes."

This is the women's first joint exhibition. Both say they recognize the privilege of exhibiting at ACS, where Martin has been a member since 2018 and Story since 2015. They also have worked together on the ACS management board for several years.

"I feel blessed to be a part of such a warm, encouraging group of artists," Story says. "In addition to being inspired and challenged, I have developed strong friendships with people I would not have known otherwise. I can rent studio space to display my work, serve on the management board in ways that promote the arts in our community, and share what I have learned by teaching painting workshops."

Martin, a self-taught glass artist whose home studio is a creative workshop for glass, paint and kilns, has been playing with glass about 20 years, moving from stained glass to 3D fused glass, experimenting with various vitreous paints incorporated in or on the glass before firing. "Inspired by nature, calm and color, I find working with fused glass challenging but satisfying," she says.

She operates a business, Artistic Glass Fusion, and attends juried art festivals

along the east coast, including Alabama, Florida, South Carolina, Georgia and her home state of New York.

Story, who describes herself as "a representational painter in oils," says, "As a speaker and writer, I try to portray through a visual language what I see around me, especially in nature. tial proof that it is home for our artwork. These exhibits show how two artist friends enjoy working together creating a visually satisfying exhibition."


They hope the enjoyment of this exhibit will bring visitors back to ACS to see more artworks.



Waterworks Visual Arts Center in Salisbury, NC, Offers Works From The Collection of Julian & Josie Robertson

The Waterworks Visual Arts Center in Salisbury, NC, will present Never Before Seen.. Modern Masterpieces, a yearlong exhibition of paintings and sculptures from the private collection of the late New York philanthropists Julian and Josie Robertson, on view from Sept. 17 through Aug. 30, 2025.

Never Before Seen.. Modern Masterpieces will include forty works by twentyeight leading European modernists, including such greats as Kandinsky, Monet, Picasso, and de Kooning. Spanning more than a century of art history, the exhibition will introduce viewers to several pivotal movements from French Impressionism to Abstract Expressionism.

Julian and Josie Robertson began collecting art in the 1980s, after Julian founded the hedge fund Tiger Management. His success with Tiger not only enabled the couple to build their collection, but also to become two of the nation's top philanthropists. Together, the Robertsons supported a wide range of causes, including medical science, education, the environment, and the arts, as well organizations combatting poverty.

Although many of these initiatives were national or even global in scale, the Robertsons never forgot Salisbury, the town where Julian was born and raised. It was here that he learned the importance of community from his parents, Blanche and Julian Robertson, both of whom were active members of the town's church and civic life. Blanche was also instrumental in the establishment of Waterworks as a regionally recognized organization in the late 1970s

"Salisbury was a wonderful place to grow up," said Julian, who attended Frank B. John School and Boyden High School (now Salisbury High), in an interview before his passing. In 1997, Julian and Josie Robertson established the Blanche and Julian Robertson Family Foundation to support local causes in memory of Julian's parents. Since its creation, the foundation has awarded millions of dollars in

grants to over 150 agencies and organizations addressing adult and family issues, education, community health concerns, performing and visual arts, tutoring and childcare, history and preservation, capital improvement, and youth activities.

The exhibition is the latest reflection of the Robertsons' dedication to this special town. "Dad would be so proud for these artworks, his 'painted children,' to be exhibited at Waterworks for the people of Salisbury to admire and ponder, and to inspire future generations," said Alexander Robertson, chairman of the board of the Robertson Foundation. "It is now up to all of us to make sure that everyone takes advantage of this amazing and unique opportunity.'

This exhibition celebrates the Robertsons by joining two of their greatest passions, art and philanthropy. To honor the couple's legacy and commitment to education, Waterworks Visual Arts Center and the Robertson Foundation have partnered to ensure that every child in Rowan County - some 19,000 students - will visit the show.

The exhibition, opening to the public Sept. 17, will coincide with the 65th anniversary of Waterworks Visual Arts Center. "How befitting and exciting to celebrate this milestone with such an extraordinary exhibition of modern and contemporary works of art," said Executive Director Anne Scott Clement

Like you are molding wet clay on a wheel and the end result pulls you into the time and place it was created. In many respects, film photography not only freezes

time, but it also slows it down. You don't have an infinite amount of images you can fire off randomly with film. With this medium, there is a set amount of photographs and each click of the shutter matters. Consequently, you visualize ahead of time. Many times you go back for better lighting or other conditions. And when the final result comes...when you have made a fine art print there is magic in full display.

Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center in Asheville Offers Exhibit Focused on the Farm at Black Mountain College

The Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center in Asheville, NC, will present *The Farm at Black Mountain College*, on view from Sept. 27 through Jan. 11, 2025. A reception will be held don Oct. 25, from 7-9pm.

The story of Black Mountain College (BMC) has grown to mythical proportions since the liberal arts school officially closed its doors in 1957. Countless books, exhibitions, and artworks have been created to capture what it was like to live and learn at this singular college and to chart its unparalleled cultural legacy. But before this exhibition and accompanying book, nobody had written about the farm at BMC in any great detail.

Built on more than a decade's worth of deep, original archival research,

The Farm at Black Mountain College exhibition constitutes a deep new history of BMC. By focusing on the farm, the exhibition sidesteps the popular paradigm of approaching BMC through its famous faculty and students, and instead offers a new cast of characters, one that includes mostly students, women, and farmers. It spotlights the importance of collaboration, both on campus among students faculty, and faculty families, and in the community with farmers and organizations in nearby cities and towns. Finally, the exhibition shows what happens when communal living is no longer communal, and offers a detailed account of the final dark days of the college, a dramatic and often dangerous story.

The opening reception and a keynote lecture will take place in conjunction with BMCM+AC's annual ReVIEWING BMC conference hosted at UNC Asheville. Exhibition themes will correspond to cocurator David Silver's book *The Farm at Black Mountain College*, to be published in partnership with Atelier Editions.

The exhibition was curated by David Silver and Bruce Johansen.

David Silver is a professor and chair of environmental studies at the University of San Francisco. He teaches classes on urban agriculture, hyperlocal food systems, and food, culture, and storytelling.

Bruce Johansen is a researcher, writer, and editor based in Minneapolis. He has published writing on themes including

American and LGBTQ history in national and regional publications.

Founded in 1933, Black Mountain College was one of the leading experimental liberal art schools in America until its closure in 1957. After the Bauhaus in Germany closed due to mounting antagonism from the Nazi Party, Josef and Anni Albers readily accepted an offer to join the Black Mountain College faculty. During their 16-year tenure in North Carolina, the Alberses helped model the college's interdisciplinary curriculum on that of the Bauhaus, attracting an unmatched ster of teachers and students including R. Buckminster Fuller, Elaine and Willem de Kooning, John Cage, Merce Cunningham, Mary Caroline (M.C.) Richards, and Robert Rauschenberg.

Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center (BMCM+AC) was founded in 1993 to celebrate the history of Black Mountain College as a forerunner in progressive interdisciplinary education and to celebrate its extraordinary impact on modern and contemporary art, dance, theater, music, and performance.

The Museum is committed to educating the public about the history of Black Mountain College and promoting awareness of its extensive legacy through exhibitions, publications, lectures, films, seminars, and oral histories. Through our permanent collection, special exhibitions, publications, and research archive, we provide access to historical materials related to the College and its influence on the field.



Tryon Arts and Crafts School in Tryon, NC, Features Works by Bayard Wootten and More

Tryon Arts and Crafts School in Tryon, NC, is presenting *Bayard Wootten Photography Exhibition*, on view through Oct. 18, 2024.

The Bayard Wootten exhibition will highlight her remarkable photography of the western Carolina mountains, with special focus on Tryon.

Bayard Wootten (1875-1959) is celebrated as one of North Carolina's most remarkable, versatile, and productive photographers. While she photographed throughout the state from her home base in New Bern, she spent time in the 1930s documenting life and nature in the western Carolina mountains, including Tryon. Her compelling images of our region's past, as well as a few other locales, will be on display.

The photographs presented consist of archival pigment prints made from digitizing the original 5"x7" and 8"x10" negatives in the Mary Bayard Morgan Wootten Photographic Collection in the North Carolina Photographic Archives at UNC, Chapel Hill. The images were chosen from among two earlier Wootten exhibits, Light and Air and The Joy is in the Going as well as newly printed work, much of it never exhibited before. In fact, this show, curated by Lili Corbus, art historian and TACS board member, and Will Barclift, Director of TACS, with the help of UNC archivist Stephen Fletcher, will constitute the largest-ever gathering of her work to be exhibited.

Wootten's photographic contributions are significant. Never afraid of adventure, she is considered the first woman aerial photographer, designed the first trademarked Pepsi-Cola logo, and was a member of the NC National Guard. She reached a level of professionalism few in her era achieved. She supported her two sons and family by maintaining successful studios from the early 1900s through 1954 when she retired, making "my Old North State" her field of work. Her collection includes a wide variety of subjects and genres, including portraits,

postcards, street scenes, architecture, gardens, and landscapes.


Wootten first visited the western mountains when she accepted her cousin Lucy Morgan's offer to make promotional photos of the Penland School of Craft that Morgan founded in 1929. Some of these Penland photos of the school will be featured in this exhibition.

Wootten returned to the mountains often and photos from her jaunts in Appalachian communities were published in classic books including *Backwoods America* (1934), *Cabins in the Laurel* (1935), and *From My Highest Hill: Carolina Mountain Folks* (1941).

She also visited Tryon in the 1930s, at least twice, staying with her friends George and Sally Cathey, owners of the Blue Ridge Weavers. While here, she photographed many landscapes and people, including Tryon toymakers, basket weavers, farmers, country roads, waterfalls, mountain vistas, and more. Most of the images in this show will be of our local region. Some places and faces may be hard to identify from our current perspective, some 90 years later, so it will be interesting to learn if any viewers recognize these scenes from our past.

There will also be future lectures on Wootten by her collection's archivist Stephen Fletcher and Dr. Corbus who will re-present a lecture on women photographers in Tryon from 1890 to 1950 (including Wootten) that was previously offered as

to which he visually integrates symbols, metaphors, and puns in his work.

On view in the Small Format Gallery will be the exhibition, *Vicki Essig: Quietude*. Essig's silk weavings are characterized by a quiet, methodical approach that reflects both her observational practices and her intimate engagement with nature.

Based in Penland, NC, Essig's creative practice involves a collection of natural materials, such as mulberry branches, dried pods, and flower petals, which she integrates into her weavings. In a distinctive seasonal endeavor, Essig raises silkworms, nurturing them through their life cycle to produce silk fibers. This process is not only a demonstration of her craftsmanship but also an exploration of the lifecycle of the material itself. Through the constant shepherding of the worms, Essig transforms the raw material into intricate, tactile surfaces that evoke the quietude of her surroundings.

Founder, John Cram (1948 - 2020), opened Blue Spiral 1 on New Year's Eve of 1990 with a vision of creating a home for the many artists who had settled in the region in the mid-to-late 20th century. Additionally, he needed a suitable space to exhibit the recently acquired estate of Southern Modernist, Will Henry Stevens (1881 - 1949).

At the time Cram opened Blue Spiral 1, Asheville was a shell of itself. Having suffered through the post-industry recession, downtown buildings were boarded up and artists were moving to the area because the rent was cheap and the scenery, inspiring. Cram recognized a need, took a chance, and made an investment that altered the trajectory of visual culture in Asheville.

What was once a defunk radio supply shop flanked by an adult theatre and plumbing supply store, is now one of the largest and busiest galleries in the South. Over three decades later, Blue Spiral 1 is the heart of a booming art scene in downtown Asheville.

For 34 years, Blue Spiral 1 has exhibited work by artists and makers in a three-story, multi-gallery setting. Maintaining a diverse and extensive exhibition schedule, the gallery presents over 25 shows annually. Thematic group exhibitions and individual artist showcases rotate in the Main and Lower Level galleries every other month, while the gallery's Upper Level features a wide array of works by over 100 represented artists



Today, these resident artists – inspired by an earlier craft force – create jewelry, pottery, sculpture, and more in the same workshops where

The artist studios are located in the same building as the Biltmore Industries Homespun Museum, directly next door to Grovewood Gallery. Free parking is available on-site

The Grovewood Village is a privately owned historic Asheville destination located adjacent to the Omni Grove Park Inn. This site once housed the weaving and woodworking operations of Biltmore Industries, an Arts and Crafts enterprise co-founded by Edith Vanderbilt. Today, the 11-acre property - listed on the National Register of Historic Places - is home to Grovewood Gallery, working artist studios, the Estes-Winn Antique Car Museum, the Biltmore Industries Homespun Museum, and Eldr restaurant.

The North Carolina Museum of Art, Winston-Salem, NC (formerly SECCA) is proud to present Domestic Imaginaries, an exhibition of photographic prints and sculptures by artist, photographer, and filmmaker Tyler Mitchell, on view in the Museum's Main Gallery, from Sept. 12 through Dec. 29, 2024. I like the idea of making images that offer an expanded lens of where Black life can reside. So, my work tries to center that as a place for meditative repose and leisure, as well as joy."

The exhibition's poetic nature ar-

moderately severe tinnitus. My hearing continues to deteriorate; having art as a focus has been very helpful way to cope with that and the tinnitus."

"I enjoyed ceramics and oil painting in high school before I discovered my visual voice in photography," adds Estock. I continued to pursue photography in college, particularly printing. Mostly self-taught, I read Ansel Adams' books and looked for workshops to pick up more skills. I studied fine art printing with John Sexton and Craig Stevens, nature photography with John Shaw, and platinum printing with Sal Lopes. I like to travel and try to combine photography and travel whenever possible, especially hiking."

"After 35 years of photography, I took a break. I studied basket weaving with Susan Laswell (Heartsong Baskets, North Carolina) and thru-hiked the Appalachian Trail. I also got hearing aids. Adjusting to hearing aids and coming off the trail after five and a half months, were both important experiences for me. I was astonished with how busy the world is, how fractured our attention. All these endeavors recharged my creativity and influenced the direction of my art."

"I returned to photography intrigued with uniting the tactile elements of basket

weaving with my photographic prints. The added dimension invites the viewer into the image. I strive to instill a peacefulness in each piece. Nature photography is my primary source of inspiration, but shapes, texture, and light interplay in many places, majestic and ordinary. My images and vessels serve as meditation points, a way for the viewer to bring some contemplation and focus into their day," says Estock.

While living on a river, Karen Kopf became fascinated by the stumps of trees dredged out and left on the river bank. She has delved into the many shapes within these forms and depicted them realistically and abstractly using a textured technique called decalomania. The forms swirl and crest like waves of wood.

Then the artist began painting on wood itself and sometimes created images based on what she saw in the grains and sometimes created images with the grain of the wood encapsulated in the strokes. This part of the exhibit includes flat panels of wood as well as other formats such as triptychs.

After studying painting in Austria for a year, Kopf established a studio in Marbella, Spain, on the Costa del Sol. Five years under the bright Spanish sun added an intensity to the colors of her palette and a wide range of experiences and exhibitions to her career as a professional artist. Upon returning to the US, she painted in upstate New York, where she was resident director of Guy Park State Historic Site. Eventually she moved to Winston-Salem where she earned a Master's


Degree from Salem College and worked for twenty years as a teacher while she and her husband raised two sons. She currently exhibits at Artworks Gallery in Winston-Salem, NC.

Kathy Schermer-Gramm, the botanical illustrator, is an obsessive observer of plant life, a visual documenter of that which grows from the soil, dwelling on identifying species and describing it with imagery. Her interpretations expand upon this. She does not look for the classical plant portrait based on Carl Linnaeus's system of taxonomy where the focus is on the reproductive cycle.

Still the documentarian, staying true to her subject, she searches out random remnants of life found on her daily woodland walks. The artist finds fascination in the smallest of details, the wonders of natural architecture created with plant materials, and the effects of seasonal changes in the environment. This is the botanically inclusive artist who uses the fine point of a pencil or brush to render those minute details and textures through a slow meditative process.

Schermer-Gramm is a Society of Botanical Artists Fellow who was raised in Southern California earning her master's degree in illustration from California State University, Fullerton. Her career includes that of book and magazine illustrator, nature educator, and college art professor. She has been a core instructor in the North Carolina Botanical Garden Botanical Art Program (UNC) for over twelve years,

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where her teaching expanded to include online courses with students from around the globe.

Schermer-Gramm botanical art, focusing on Southeastern flora and edibles, has been juried annually into the American Society of Botanical Artists, Guild of Natural Science Illustrators, Society of Botanical Artists, and Birds in Art international exhibitions.

With a Bachelor of Fine Arts from the Cleveland Institute of Art, Cleveland,





Because of these intermarriages, many of Gay's paintings entered Southern collections.

The museum worked with descendants of the Gay family, as well as several art institutions and representatives from Coker University in order to bring the artworks together. The exhibition is sponsored by the Trustees of the Florence Museum.

The exhibit takes a look at Gay's artistic

development through the lens of his involvement with the National Academy of Design, with a special focus on the works Gay created in and of South Carolina.

The National Academy was the country's most influential art institution in the 19th century. Gay was a member for almost 60 years and was heavily involved in its affairs.

"The foremost purpose is to present Edward Gay as an artist of the Academy, whose work represents a significant transformation in American landscape painting around the turn of the century, which just so happens to coincide with the time he began traveling here," Motte said.

The exhibition includes a portrait of Gay painted by former Academy president Thomas Waterman Wood, and a large canvas of Black Creek, Hartsville, that won Bronze Medal at the St. Louis World's Fair in 1904.

the United States and abroad, including exhibitions in Japan, Mexico, Germany, Italy, UK, and Greece. Her works are represented by Hooks-Epstein galleries in Houston, TX, and Galeria 910 in Oaxaca, Mexico.

Ono Gray offered the following artist statement, "Reflecting a life which is both culturally Japanese and American, my graphite drawings hybridize influences from traditional Japanese calligraphy combined with Western drawing practices and aesthetics."

"Growing up in Japan, every Saturday afternoon was spent with my Sensei, a calligraphy master who would assign words for each of us to practice. We would spend hours producing copies of the Sensei's sample," adds Ono Gray. "The goal was to imitate the sample, paying attention to the line quality, the varying speed, the pressure and angle of the brush movement. The handling of the brush had to become rhythmic and graceful."

"At high school age, in preparation to entrance exam to art university in Japan, I had to take private lessons to learn drawing with graphite and charcoal practicing techniques such as chiaroscuro and sfumato. Saturday afternoons were replaced by a Western style art studio with pedestals, still lifes, and white marble copies of Roman busts, instead of tatami mat calligraphy studio sitting on the floor. The fluid ink was replaced with malleable graphite and ephemeral charcoal. The wet immediacy of calligraphic line was replaced with illusionistic volumes meticulously rendered. Instead of going through dozens of rice papers in a session, one sheet of high-quality cotton paper was given to work on.'

"Traditional Japanese art-forms have often integrated word and image, and my interest and practice also follow the path in my unique way. In my works I mostly use images of persons, animals, and still-lifes captured in my daily experiences. I assign a matching Japanese proverb to go with the

image, which is spelled out with hiragana and kanji characters intertwined to create a single line. The calligraphic line begins at the top right and end toward the bottom left of the page, following traditional Japanese writing. The single line going through a pictorial plane is a metaphor of a life; the continuation of our life which begins with the birth and entrance to physical body, one exit as death and loss of physical body, and all the complicated path we take in between. Proverbs are short and poetic, yet powerful and true, resonating to us today confirming the never changing characteristics of human emotions and behavior, providing timeless lessons and teachings."

"More recent works often incorporate the image of bubbles. Bubbles represent energy. In 'pulsating still life' series, these are energy emitted by atoms which compose matter and form. Bubbles also represent our soul or spirit, which is invisible, yet we encompass along with our physical form. I create at least one self-portrait a year to record the sign and progress of my physical decay. As I age and my body continue to deteriorate, more I am fascinated by or want to believe in the existence of the intangible- soul or spirit," says Ono Gray.



Morrow received her bachelor's degree in nursing from UNC Chapel Hill.

She worked as a nurse, activist, and homeschool teacher.

She was a representative for Liberty First Grassroots, a conservative political action committee, and legislative liaison at Pavement Education Project, which says it "offers parents and citizens an opportunity to see what books are available in NC Schools." She's a book banner.

Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, Offers New Exhibit

The Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, will present Color Comes Alive, which highlights the work of artists Marcy Lansman, Pat Merriman and Pringle Teetor, on view from Sept. 24 through Oct. 20, 2024. A reception will be held on Sept. 27, from 6-9pm.

Many of Marcy Lansman's paintings have been inspired by what she sees on walks in the woods near her home in Chapel Hill, NC. Lansman begins with an underpainting of bright patches of color. Then, using a palette knife, she fills the painting with random strokes that together create the illusion of light hitting trees. Speckles of color from the underpainting show through the random shapes created by the palette

"The effect," says Lansman, "is to liven up the painting, mimicking splashes of light we see in nature." This technique is especially suited to paintings of trees since, from a distance, the leaves on a tree look like random patches that vary not only in brightness, but in color.'

Lansman wants her paintings to take the viewers out of their busy world into the peace and quiet of the woods.

Pat Merriman's paintings reflect her love of North Carolina, her native state. Constant experimentation keeps her work fresh, innovative, interesting and unique. "I am inspired to try new techniques, paints, and brushes and see what they add to my work. Currently I am exploring the use of different techniques and materials to create snow scenes." Experimentation helps encourage creativity, and broadens an artist's perspective. "I believe it breathes life into artwork," says Merriman, "and hope you will come see what it has brought to my work in this show.'

This year has been challenging for glassblower Pringle Teetor. She missed almost 3 months in the studio due to shoulder surgery and was not able to get back until mid-June.

"At first, I just practiced simple forms" said Teetor, "but I made them a little different. I picked random colors for these pieces as I was mainly practicing, but they turned out very well. Footed bowls are something I love to make but have struggled with in the past because of my shoulder problems."

'With Color Comes Alive as the theme of the show, I put colors together for bright contrast, like purple and orange for some of the bowls," says Teetor.

Teetor also has carved pieces in the show, a cold decorative technique called battuto, done with diamond wheels on a lathe. It is a very lengthy, tedious technique, and requires planning layers of color so that cutting through one layer reveals another color

'Years ago, I fell in love with the motion and dance of the heat and fire," she adds, "It blends physical, technical and artistic skills. It's physically demanding and hard on the body. It's exhausting, but yet, I still love it."

The Hillsborough Gallery of Arts is owned and operated by 21 local artists exhibiting contemporary fine art and fine craft. The Gallery's offerings include oil, acrylic and watercolor paintings, metal sculpture, figurative sculpture, ceramics, photography, photomontage, painted gourds, mixed media, jewelry, glass, and handcrafted furniture. 

There was a lot of work for her to bring this "green horse" along and she needed help from a professional. Johnson (1901 - 1970) was a man between worlds: raised in the rural South, but educated in New York; black, but his unknown father was white; American-born, but lived much of his adult life in Europe. This diverse heritage gave Johnson a unique perspective and insight, but at times it was also a difficult shadow which followed him as he traveled the world in search of his true artistic voice. Eventually, after many years away from his hometown of Florence, SC, Johnson returned to the United States. Although living in New York, his art began to focus almost entirely on the lives and experiences of African Americans in the rural South. "My travels taught me that an artist must live and paint in his own environment... This development shall continue for the rest of my life and it is the painting of my people," said Johnson in 1941. Special Exhibit Gallery, Through Feb. 23, 2025 - "Edward Gay: An American Landscape Painter". New York based artist Edward Gay (1837 - 1928) began visiting and painting in South Carolina after his daughter Vivien, an architecture student at Cornell University, was married to James Lide Coker, Jr., of Hartsville. Years later, the artist's son Duncan married James Coker's sister, Jennie. Because of these intermarriages, many of Gay's paintings entered Southern collections. "There's a story to be told here," said museum curator Stephen W. Motte, "This is an exhibition we have been looking forward to for a long time." After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor, Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. Each section explores seemingly opposing forces, prompting viewers to reconsider the nuances and complexities of life. "Our brains gravitate toward hard distinctions, but life is filled with gradations, complexities, and ambiguities. The categories offer a context for considering the pictures," said Ware. "They sound like opposites, but it is up to visitors to decide if these dualities are different or part of a continuum." The Van Winkle Law Firm Gallery, Through Oct. 21 - "Honoring Nature: Early Southern Appalachian Landscape Painting". This exhibition explores the sublime natural landscapes of the Smoky Mountains of Western North Carolina and Tennessee. While there were several regional schools of painting around the early 1900s, this group is largely from the Midwest, and many of the artists trained at the Art Institute of Chicago or in New York City. Through their travels, they captured waterfalls, sunsets, thunderstorms, autumn foliage, lush green summers, and snow-covered mountainselements that were novel for viewers from cities and rural areas. Though some of these paintings include people, they are usually used for scale and painted with little to no detail, highlighting the magnificence of nature. Debra McClinton Gallery, Through Mar. 31, 2025 - "Forces of Nature: Ceramics from the Hayes Collection". Ceramic artists throughout history have become masters of all four elements - creating clay from a mixture of earth and water to shape their work, drying it in air, and hardening it in fire. Throughout this process, the artist decides which aspects of the work will be tightly controlled, and when the elements can step in to leave nature's mark. This exhibition traces the historical, stylistic, and conceptual origins of work that either embraces or refuses the element of chance in ceramics, looking at modern and contemporary work made in Western North Carolina. The ceramics in this exhibition are all drawn from the robust collection of Andrew and Hathia Hayes, who have been collecting important regional pottery and sculpture for decades. Through their close relationships with artists, they have brought together works that show not only the different aesthetics seen in the region, but also a picture of the ceramics community. Regional artists including Cynthia Bringle, Donna Craven, Mark Hewitt, Fred Johnston, Ben Owen III, and Norm Schulman will be on view, demonstrating the many different approaches to ceramics in this region. Judith S. Moore Gallery, Through Oct. 7 - "Western North Carolina Glass: Selections from the Collection". Western North Carolina is important in the history of American glass art. Several artists of the Studio Glass Movement came to the region, including its founder Harvey K. Littleton. Begun in 1962 in Wisconsin, it was a student of Littleton's that first came to the area in 1965 and set up a glass studio at the Penland School of Craft in Penland, North Carolina. By 1967, Mark Peiser was the first glass artist resident at the school and taught many notable artists, like Jak Brewer in 1968 and Richard Ritter who came to study in 1971. By 1977, Littleton retired from teaching and moved to nearby Spruce Pine, North Carolina and set up a glass studio at his nome. Since that time, glass artists like Ken Carder, Rick and Valerie Beck, Shane Fero, and Yaffa Sikorsky and Jeff Toddto name only a few-have flocked to the area to reside, collaborate, and teach, making it a significant place for experimentation and education in glass. Ongoing - The Asheville Art Museum, the hub for 20th- and 21st-century American art in Western North Carolina, has re-opened to the public. The \$24+ million, state-of-the-art facility encompasses 54,000 square feet and adds 70 percent more Collection gallery space. Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center, 120 College Street, Asheville. Through Sept. 7 - "Robert Chapman Turner: Artist, Teacher, Explorer". Robert Turner (1913-2005) arrived at Black Mountain College in 1949 to establish the first studio pottery program at the College. He worked with student architect Paul Williams to design the Potshop and stayed until 1951 as a teacher and potter. There he formed lifelong friendships with M.C. Richards, Joe Fiore, and Natasha Goldowski Renner, and was part of the lively mix of art and ideas generated by Clement Greenberg, Katherine Litz, Kenneth Noland, Theodoros Stamos, and many others. Turner's education prior to his arrival at Black Mountain included Swarthmore College, Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, The Barnes Foundation, Penland School of Crafts, and Alfred University. After Black Mountain, Turner and his family moved to Alfred Station, NY where they bought a farm, and he established a successful studio pottery practice and actively exhibited his work in galleries across the U.S. In 1958 he began teaching pottery and sculpture at Alfred University where he became an essential part of the art department until his retirement in 1979. Sept. 27 - Jan. 11, 2025 - "The Farm at Black Mountain College". A reception will be held on Oct. 25, from 7-9pm. The story of Black Mountain College (BMC) has grown to mythical proportions since the liberal arts school officially closed its doors in 1957. Countless books, exhibitions, and artworks have been created to capture what it was like to live and learn at this singular college and to chart its unparalleled cultural legacy. But before this exhibition and accompanying book, nobody had written about the farm at BMC in any great detail. Built on more than a decade's worth of deep, original archival research, "The Farm at Black Mountain College" exhibition constitutes a deep new history of BMC. By focusing on the farm, the exhibition sidesteps the popular paradigm of approaching BMC through its famous faculty and students, and instead offers a new cast of characters, one that includes mostly students, women, and farmers. It spotlights the importance of collaboration, both on campus among students, faculty, and faculty families, and in the community with farmers and organizations in nearby cities and towns. Finally, the exhibition shows what happens when communal living is no longer communal, and offers a detailed account of the final dark days of the college, a dramatic and often dangerous story. She is interested in exploring the limits of existing structures within painting, language, textile patterning, new media, and emerging modes of teaching and learning. Maud Gatewood (1934-2004) is an exceptional figure in the art history of North Carolina and the American Southeast, A painter of exacting technique with a keen eye for composition and cultural commentary, ner pictures capture the Carolinas (and the expanding world beyond) across much of the 20th Century. A native of Yanceyville in Caswell County, NC, Gatewood's paintings reveal rural landscapes and their denizens in the midst of transformation while also cleverly framing the experience of modern life with acerbic wit and a surprising wealth of empathy. "The Hard Edge & The Soft Line: A Retrospective of Maud Gatewood" is a major undertaking by BRAHM. This retrospective project provides a comprehensive narrative of Gatewood's career, considering the evolution of her oeuvre and her significant contributions, as an artist and an educator, to the field of contemporary representational painting in North Carolina and the region. A recuperative exercise. the exhibition and its accompanying scholarship will feature a broad range of her works, including paintings, works on paper, and archival material, excavating Gatewood's rigorous technical experimentation, coded but no less rich explorations of gender and sexuality, and reverence for depicting the built and natural landscapes of her native state and elsewhere. "Horn licks in cartoons are spectacular." When her parents gave her an SLR camera that year for her 19th birthday, she put down her horn and started making images. The artist notes. "I was smitten by the amazing properties of photography. The idea that I could aim my camera at something or someone that interested me, develop the film, make a print, study the print, and learn from it still captivates me after 41 years." Young taks about this exhibit, "It all started with a disagreement with a friend. She stated vehemently that all the Confederate Monuments needed to come down. Now. Although I understand the conflict that the monuments present, my gut reaction was, 'No damn Yankee is going to tell me what to do with my statues!' As a Southerner, I often felt that most Northern attitudes toward the South were misconceptions. Now I see those misconceptions have dark truths behind them. Two window works "Double Trap" and "Single Use II" mirror each other and parallel the modular units in the paintings. The interlocking shapes form large mazes made of window film. Ackland Art Museum, UNC - Chapel Hill, Columbia & Franklin Streets, Chapel Hill. Sept. 27 - Jan.5, 2025 - "Dürer to Matisse: 400 Years of European Prints". The exhibition offers an exceptional opportunity to view nearly 100 prints by some of the most recognized artists active from the late fifteenth century to the mid-twentieth century, beginning and ending with two towering giants of printmaking—Albrecht Dürer and Henri Matisse. The Ackland Art Museum holds North Carolina's largest and most comprehensive collections of art on paper, but due to light sensitivity, these works can only be displayed for short periods. Works by Rembrandt van Rijn, Giovanni Battista Piranesi, Francisco de Goya, Edgar Degas, Mary Cassatt, Vincent van Gogh, Käthe Kollwitz, Edvard Munch, and many others, showcase the craftsmanship, expressive power, and aesthetic beauty achieved through printmaking. While a more personal selection emphasizing high quality and good condition than a comprehensive history of the medium, the prints on view do chart the progression of art historical movements from the Renaissance to Cubism and beyond, through woodcuts, engravings, etchings, aquatints, mezzotints, and lithographs. Some newly acquired and never before displayed at the Ackland, and others off view for decades, these prints reveal how the use of black ink, paper, and various printmaking techniques can create a wealth of innovative and technically stunning works of art. Through Nov. 10 - "Focus on the Peck Collection: Imagined Landscapes". Before the emergence of landscape as its own subject in Europe during the late sixteenth century, medieval and Renaissance artists crafted fantastical landscape backdrops for biblical and mythological subjects. Though artists in the seventeenth century, particularly in the Netherlands, increasingly studied the natural world and recorded existing views of their surrounding environs, painters and draftsmen often reordered, refashioned, or completely transformed observed elements, creating picturesque scenes that were conceived rather than experienced. This Focus on the Peck Collection installation presents three seventeenth-century drawings whose topographical specificity, atmospheric realism, and pictorial plausibility make it difficult to distinguish reality from imagination. Artist Jackie Milad presents mixed-media abstract paintings and collages that address the history and complexities of dispersed cultural heritage and multi-ethnic identity. A Baltimore City-based artist, her paintings, collages, and sculptures explore global migration inspired by her identity as a first-generation American citizen. She creates layered two-dimensional works that are primarily paintings but that also incorporate collage elements, such as found and stenciled fabrics, notions, and pieces of paper. The Delhom Service League (DSL) provided a half-century of generous support and impactful initiatives to The Mint Museum, helping to fund the acquisition of more than 200 works of art in the Mint's collection. The exhibition celebrates the Delhom Service

League's enthusiastic support for the Mint by proudly displaying significant works funded or gifted by the affiliate group, plus selected publications, photographs and other memorabilia. In 2022, the Delhom Service League made the difficult decision to dissolve as a Mint affiliate. The league nevertheless remains an indelible part of the Mint's history, and its many contributions rightly deserve the museum's never-ending recognition and gratitude. Ongoing - "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". From crocks, jars, and jugs to pitchers, candleholders, and vases, "turning pots" is one of the oldest and richest craft traditions in North Carolina. For more than 200 years, members of the Cole family have been potting in central North Carolina - Randolph, Moore, Lee, and Montgomery counties. Six generations of Coles, and no fewer than 18 individuals, are represented in The Mint Museum's permanent collection. More than 60 highlights of their wares are included in the installation "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". One reason for its long-term success is that making pottery has so often been a family tradition in the state. Fathers taught the art of forming, glazing, and firing clay objects to their sons, and in later generations also to daughters, who in turn taught their children, and so on through the decades. These family dynasties not only helped to keep the potting craft alive, but ensured continuity in techniques and craftsmanship, as well as introduced artistic innovations in succeeding generations. "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters" presents a visual history of "turned pots" and the family that helped turn North Carolina into one of America's centers for handmade, traditional pottery. Bridges and **Levine Galleries, Ongoing -** "Contemporary British Studio Ceramics: The Grainer Collection". Focused on the collection of Diane and Marc Grainer, this installation is a survey of contemporary British studio ceramics. Comprising functional and sculptural objects made between the 1980s and today, the show features work by artists either born or residing in Great Britain, including established "contemporary classics" like Gordon Baldwin and Rupert Spira, and cuttingedge ceramicists such as Julian Stair and Kate Malone. Several recently-gifted works from the Grainers are included. Alexander, Spangler, and Harris Galleries, Ongoing - "Portals to the Past: British Ceramics 1675 - 1825". The Mint Museum's collection of eighteenth-century British pottery and porcelain is widely respected for its scope and quality. Notable eighteenth-century porcelain factories represented include Chelsea, Bow, and Vauxhall in London, Longton Hall in Staffordshire, Worcester, Bristol, and others. Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. Ongoing - "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other imerican giass companies, iliustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. Plans were eventually made to build a gated community on the Oz site and demolition of the park's attractions began in the late 1980s. This installation brings together sculptures, drawings and photographs that might be hard for most of us to comprehend. They challenge convention and encourage close viewing. Reminiscent of an ancient and official text, Ion Bitzan's Old Document of Ownership is comprised of a vaguely recognizable but invented and indecipherable language. Photographs by Brittany Nelson and Letha Wilson employ experimental techniques to challenge our assumptions of photography. Wilson uses materials such as concrete, which oozes out of the photograph in Tent Rocks, to create unconventional landscapes. Nelson's photographs use digital and analog processes without a camera to make holographic, geometric shapes. Artists often imbue their works with paradox. Christian Marclay's Breathless III, a recorder, and Secret, a record, are found objects modified by the artist so that they no longer function. No one can play music on these objects because of iviarciay's simple but irreversible modifications Colin Quashie and Sanford Biggers also use found objects, combining them with absurdist humor to raise serious questions of identity and history. These inscrutable objects are filled with subtle social commentary to question how we perceive the world around us. Through July 20, 2025 - "Art of the U.S.: American Stories/ American Myths." What comes to mind when you think of the history of the United States? The "discovery" of the continent by European explorers? The American Revolution and founding of the country? Westward expansion, or perhaps the turmoil of the Civil War? This reinstalled gallery incorporates historical and contemporary works of art from the United States to tell some of these stories and confront some of these myths. The gallery includes a variety of works to encourage visitors to think about how these narratives shape our understanding and may preserve or counter fallacies of nationhood and democracy. Through July 15, 2025 - "Art of the Andes". Art of the Andes features ceramics, textiles, metalwork, and carvings produced by cultures across the Andes region, a 4,500-mile-long mountain range on the Pacific Coast of South America. These objects, many on view for the first time, reveal the diverse and

sophisticated artmaking techniques through

which ancient Andeans expressed ancestral beliefs and personal and political identities. The wall case provides a comparative view of the ceramic production of several prominent Peruvian civilizations, presented chronologically from left to right. From the colorful painted motifs of the Nasca and the sculptural realism of the Moche to the whistling vessels of the Chancay, the ceramics depict both realistic and stylized animals, people, deities, food, and scenes of warfare, performance, and pleasure. Ongoing - The Collection Galleries feature rotating installations of the Nasher Museum's extensive holdings of historical art. Eight galleries, as well as the entrance to Wilson Pavilion, are dedicated to the museum's strengths, which represent a brief history of human creativity from different times and parts of the world. Just beyond the entrance, visitors will find the Incubator, a flexible space for rotating student- and faculty-curated exhibitions. Visitors are invited to return again and again to The Collection Galleries, where Nasher curators continue to refresh the galleries with gems from the collection. Drawn from the Weatherspoon's stellar collection, these photographs illustrate what artists have had to say about American culture from the late 19th- to the early twenty-first centuries. The period spanned by these images shows tremendous change—from civil war battles, western expansion vistas, and class and racial divisions to life in rural America today, increased economic prosperity, and hints of cultural alienation. Photographs such as the ones featured in this exhibition have shaped our ever-evolving definition of what the terms "America" and "American" mean-through the pictorial images themselves and via our interpretations of them, both at the time of their fabrication and presentday. While Carleton Watkins's and William Henry Jackson's photographs were meant to impress armchair viewers with the majesty of the untamed West, Roger Minick and Robert von Sternberg's photographs highlight the humor found in the actions of tourists who visited such landscapes. Despite the 150+ years that separate the creation of Lewis Hine's and Leonard Freed's images,

Berenice Abbott, Frank Paulin, Garry Winogrand, and Burk Uzzle focused on the vital interaction between three aspects of urban life: its diverse people; the places they live, work, and play; and their daily activities. Place is equally important in the photographs by William Christenberry, Stuart Klipper, and Alfred Steiglitz. Lastly, psychologically probing images by Diane Arbus, Donna Ferrato, Nikki Lee, Robert Mapplethorpe, and Francesca Woodman round out the offerings. The Gregory D. For thousands of years cultures around the world have used cloth as a means of visual communication—a way to document, celebrate, commemorate, and depict events large and small. Nonverbal tools play an important role in interactions within and between cultures, as verbal communication comprises only a small part of the ways that we, as human beings, share information and connect with each other. "Material Messages" features textiles created by a diversity of global artists that highlight this communication through cloth. Through Feb. 8, 2025 - "BABENGA - The Sacred Forest". Cameroonian artist Jean Michel Dissake's sculptural works use found and recycled materials to represent a balance between nature and technology by weaving natural objects such as wood, vines, termite dust, water hyacinths, and palm fronds together with computer boards, aluminum wire, license plates, and car parts. relationship between two global superpowers, the Republic of Venice and the Ottoman Empire, over four centuries (circa 1400-1800). Through a rich body of works reflecting both Venetian and Ottoman origins, "Venice and the Ottoman Empire" documents interactions between the two rival Mediterranean states across multiple cultural arenas-political, diplomatic, economic, artistic, technological, and culinary. The Venetian loans are joined by a trove of recently salvaged objects from a major Adriatic shipwreck, the large Venetian merchant ship Gagliana Grossa that sank while traveling from Venice to Istanbul in 1583. These spectacular items have never been exhibited outside Croatia, where the wreck is located. Featuring more than 190 works in a broad range of media, the exhibition draws from the vast collections of Venice's storied civic museums, including the Museo Correr, Palazzo Ducale, Palazzo Mocenigo, and Museo Fortuny, as well as the NCMA's own extensive holdings of Venetian art. Highlights include paintings by Jacobello del Fiore, Vittore Carpaccio, and Gentile Bellini and luxury Venetian and Ottoman goods including textiles, ceramics, metalwork objects, glassware, armor, books, and leatherware. Soon after midnight on July 6, 1932, Smith was shot on a sleeping porch at the family's country estate. Smith died later that morning. Smith's wife Libby Holman and Smith's childhood friend and secretary Albert "Ab" Walker wre ultimately charged with first-degree murder. In a stunning reversal, the case was dropped before coming to trial. To this day, it is not known whether Smith Reynolds, 20-year-old heir and renowned aviator, died by suicide, accident or murder.
